

TRUE PROPHETS

In Deuteronomy today we hear that God's very words will fill the mouth of a true prophet, but a false prophet will, in a manner of speaking, put mere mortal words into God's mouth. In Mark's Gospel, we see Jesus teaching and healing as a true prophet, one filled with the authority of God's own voice. The whole history of our church is filled with both true and false prophets. Some false prophets were extremely popular and quite well-versed in scripture, and even held positions of authority. But in today's Gospel we learn that Jesus' fame spread because he taught with authority; he wasn't an authority because he was popular or famous. We also learn from him, in his desert temptation confrontations with Satan, that anyone can quote scripture, even against God's purposes. Today we hear that his authority was not like that of the scribes, who held the official positions of religious authority in his day. Our work is to do our best to discern the true prophets in our midst, and to be true prophets as well. The psalmist tells us how to do this: by not hardening our hearts when God speaks. If we truly listen to God, it will be God's very words filling our mouths.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This is the year of St. Paul. One of the most visited churches of Rome is also one of the most beautiful: the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls. Like so many other churches, it was founded by Emperor Constantine about the year 315. Paul was martyred outside the walls of the City of Rome at a place called Tre Fontaine, probably on June 29, in the year 65, perhaps the first anniversary of St. Peter's crucifixion. Christians buried him in a quiet place about two miles away, and visited to pray. Constantine was running low on bricks, because the first church was tiny. In 386 it was demolished and today's basilica begun. This vast and towering space looks much the same today as it did in the fourth century.

The centuries have not been kind to ancient Rome, but until early 1800s St. Paul Outside the Walls survived beautifully, perhaps because it was assigned for nearly a thousand years to Benedictine monks. It was a vibrant place of daily prayer even when Rome was a poor and nearly abandoned city. In 1823 a great fire resulted from a botched repair job, and St. Paul's was destroyed. It is said that the whole world contributed to its restoration. Even the Russian czar and the viceroy of Egypt gave alabaster, malachite, and lapis lazuli for the pillars and the tabernacle. Several of the precious mosaics were able to be restored. One of the great treasures of the basilica is a set of prison chains, said to have been worn by the Apostle in the last days before his martyrdom.

Usually I begin my letter to you on the Annual Appeal with a report on how we have done in this past year. But, this time I just want to tell you how grateful I am to each and every one of you for your help. My years as a pastor have taught me that the personal involvement and support of the pastors for the ACA is essential and I thank you for that. Now to where we stand. With two months still remaining in the 2017 Annual Catholic Appeal, over \$14.3 million has been raised to date, continuing the generous support of the people of God in the Archdiocese of Chicago. You are directly responsible for this year's success. Thank you!

Our Annual Catholic Appeal is framed in the words of Jesus: *Come, follow me.* It is an invitation to be Christ for others and to live in a community of discipleship. As Christ's community we help to sustain Catholic schools and parishes in need, support programs of religious education, ministerial formation, and promote the protection of life and peace and justice. Through the Annual Appeal we together support the efforts of Catholic Relief Services that cares for people across the globe who struggle and suffer because of natural disasters.

BISHOP DAVID ZUBIK'S LETTER TO PRIESTS ABOUT THE FLU SEASON CATHOLIC DIOCESE OF PITTSBURGH

Dear Father:

Over the years as each flu season arrives, concerns are raised over the possibility of transmitting viruses during liturgical celebrations.

The potential for an individual to contact the flu virus exists everywhere. Liturgical practices are one of many encounters throughout the day that are capable of transmitting viruses.

Given that fact, and having consulted several of the diocesan boards on this matter, it is a wise pastoral practice to remind parishioners that each person should be responsible for taking precautions as he or she sees fit. The decision whether or not to receive the Body and Blood under both species remains with the individual communicant. Christ is real and truly present under each species. Those uncomfortable receiving from the Cup during the flu season should not feel obligated to do so.

Similarly, it would be good to remind parishioners that there is no single gesture required for the Sign of Peace. If during the flu season a handshake or an embrace raise concerns, a bow is a perfectly acceptable means – at any time of the year – to express our peace in Jesus Christ before we share the Eucharist.

It is also a good time to remind all parishioners of important hygienic practices. Doctors inform us that viral diseases are most often passed along through coughs, sneezes or physical contact. Parishioners should be reminded to have clean tissues or handkerchiefs with them and to put them away for proper disposal later. Most of all, it is very important to remind parishioners that they are not bound by any obligation to attend Mass on Sunday if they are sick or have been exposed to the flu. They should return to church only when they are well.

All liturgical ministers should be reminded of the importance of good hygienic practices. Our diocesan website (www.diopitt.org) offers solid hygienic practices for all ministers of Communion, clergy and laity:

- Wash hands with an alcohol-based anti-bacterial solution and dry with a clean towel. At the Sign of Peace, consider using a gesture that does not involve shaking many hands.
- When folding hands, don't raise them to touch your face.
- Do not wipe your mouth with the purificator.
- Never use the purficator as a handkerchief.
- In distributing the sacred Host, carefully avoid direct contact between your fingers and the hand or tongue of the communicant.
- In Communion from the chalice, be sure to wipe both inside and outside of the rim after each communicant. Then turn the cup a bit for the next communicant. Also, remember to keep shifting the purificator so that you are not wiping with the same part of the cloth over and over again.
- After the ritual cleansing of the chalices, they should be carefully cleaned with anti-bacterial soap and warm water, then dried with clean towels.

Common sense and good hygienic practices can accomplish far more in lessening the impact of the flu than any mandates.

At this time, there appears to be no need for the introduction of widespread liturgical adaptations to counter the flu. Still, we will continue to monitor all this together as a diocese, along with the Church throughout the country.

DEACON'S CORNER By Deacon John Sfire, January 16, 2018

The gospel this past Sunday, John 1: 35-42, tells of the beginning of the public ministry of Jesus. Also the forming of the "disciples" of Jesus. Andrew, who was a "disciple" of John the Baptist, left John to follow Jesus. He is said to be the first "disciple." And all the writing about "disciples" got me curious about "what is a disciple?" One of the definitions Webster has for "disciple" is "a follower of Christ", and this made sense to me based on the way I was taught growing up about Jesus and His followers.

I can remember back in grade school and even high school, the bible wasn't something that we spent much time reading. We had our Baltimore Catechism and left the bible to the priests. I guess it was around Vatican II in the 60s that we began to use the bible for both quiet reading and gaining more insight into the days before, during and after Jesus Christ.

While using the bible to help us better understand, especially the life of Jesus Christ, it sometimes was difficult to discern the message, especially in the New Testament. And I am referring mainly to the gospels of the four Evangelists; Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Since most of the gospels written are parables from Jesus, we have to read carefully to discern the message Jesus is giving us. And I believe that everything in all the gospels contains a message from Jesus Christ that can relate to so many of our daily challenges and encounters both within ourselves and with others. So what makes it difficult for us to "hear" the words of Our Lord? You might ask: "Deacon John, if we are reading Scripture, how are we supposed to 'hear' the Words of Our Lord?"

I believe the answer to that question is quite simple. We must open our hearts and our minds "to be one with the Lord." Don't just read the words of Scripture for the sake of reading. Read the words over and over again until you "hear" the message Jesus wants us to "hear" each time we read. And I say this from my own experiences of reading Scripture and not fully understanding the message Jesus has for me. And then I realized that I am not "hearing" the words I was reading. Perhaps this a little difficult to comprehend right now, but I assure you that if you take time to read the words of Scripture, you will soon begin "hearing" the Word of God that is in His message.

Now back to where I began up top with "disciples." For a long time, I for one, put the "disciples" of Jesus on a pedestal. Putting them above all others simply because they were chosen by Jesus Christ to "go out and teach ye all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." Then, some time ago, I came to realize that a "disciple" is anyone who spreads the Word of God. And in this thinking, I also came to realize that we are all "disciples" of Jesus Christ. We are all "disciples" and with that, we are on our journey on earth to: "Love the Lord, thy God, and Love your neighbor as ourselves." If we abide in these two Commandments, we are truly "disciples" of Jesus Christ. We are living our lives as Jesus taught us and abiding in His Word on our Road to Salvation.

We are "disciples" who spread His Word in two ways. I believe that not only can we spread His Word by speaking the Word of God, but also we spread His Word by example. And that example and speaking should begin at home with our family and loved ones. To spread His Word does not mean we have to go out and "preach from the rooftops." It simply means that if we abide in the two Commandments mentioned above, our lives will be examples to those around us.

So as we approach the Season of Lent, let us make a concerted effort to outwardly become a "disciple" of Jesus Christ and I promise you this Lent will be a life-changer for us all. My blessings to all,

A CALL FOR CATHOLIC EDUCATION

The following speech was addressed to the St. Francis de Sales Parish community and was written and delivered by Mr. Kyle Schmitt, M.A. Ed. (SFS Parish School Principal) at Masses during the weekend of July 29-30, 2017.

Thank you, Father Ryan, for inviting me to speak today. I appreciate the opportunity to address all of you about what I believe is a very important issue: education, and in particular, Catholic education. I want to do 4 things:

I want to tell you some facts about our school.

I want to tell you about our mission and purpose and how that differentiates us from the public schools.

I want to make a plea for the importance of Catholic education generally.

And then I want to end with an invitation.

Facts about our School

I want to start out with some facts about St. Francis de Sales Parish School.

We serve children from age 3 until 8th grade with a preschool—8th grade program.

We have an enrollment of over 350 students—which makes us one of the larger PreK-8 schools in the Archdiocese. Our average class size is less than 22 students.

Our single student tuition for grades K-8 is \$4,055, which is the lowest published tuition rate for Archdiocesan schools in the region. The regional average is over \$5,000.

We won the national Blue Ribbon award for school excellence in 2007. Only the top 10% of schools in the country received that award.

We are an Illinois State Board of Education recognized school.

We are a national accredited school through the AdvancED organization for continuous school improvement. This summer, our 8th grade graduates scored in the 57th percentile of all incoming freshmen at Carmel Catholic High School, which is just one piece of evidence that our student academic outcomes are, on average, stronger than the schools around us.

I could go on, but more important than the facts about the school are the reasons why the school exists.

Mission and Purpose of Our School and How that Differentiates Itself from Other Schools

Our mission is to *create a community of faith in which students, teachers, and parents live the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, share knowledge in a spirit of freedom and love, and cultivate service to God and neighbor.* I love that mission statement, don't you? If even half the students in the country graduated from a school with a mission statement like that, can you imagine what our country could be like? For comparison, the mission statement from Community Unit School District 95 is to "*empower every learner to achieve personal excellence.*" That is also an excellent mission, but I think those two very different mission statements show how different we are from public schools.

The initial response I sometimes get from prospective parents considering enrolling their kids at our school is, "Why should we pay tuition to attend this school when the public schools have good academics and they are free?" Father Ryan and I are aligned in that we want to only speak positively about the public schools around St. Francis. So my answer is always focused on what **differentiates** St. Francis and I use two ideas: the first is **Catholic ontology** and the second is **Catholic community**. By ontology I mean our conception of a human being. We are called to be Christ for one another and to see Christ in one another. When we look at a child, we see a gift from God. We know that God has a plan for that child's life that we want to help them discover and live. We want college, career, AND heaven. When you look at a child as a gift from God, when you part of a small community and you know that child and their family the way you think about, talk about, and act towards that child can be very different. In public schools, the ontology is different. Large schools rely on numerical identification, student IDs, and you would get in trouble as a teacher if you invoke God or Christ. The implications of this difference in ontology show up in how we treat our students, what we teach our students, and how we handle behavioral concerns to name just a few domains.

If you have any doubt as to the significance of Catholic ontology, consider that according to Pew Research Center, 80% of the religiously unaffiliated believe that abortion should be legal in **most or all circumstances**. **80%**. The number is obviously far lower for those identifying as Catholics.

The second differentiator, connected to the first, is Catholic community. I can tell from even this short month I've been here that this is a community with lots of rich relationships and many connections spanning long periods of time. I want to be a part of that. I want my daughters to be a part of that. I think everyone benefits who is already a part of it. Another reason I think this Catholic community is important is educational.

Educators talk about two types of curriculum: there is the **visible** curriculum which is what is taught in classes and there is the **invisible** curriculum, or, the hidden curriculum, which is what kids learn from social groups, and from inferring beliefs from observing behaviors of those around them. We know that older children, adolescents, and teenagers learn as much or more from their social groups as from their parents, teachers, and other adults. The hidden curriculum is powerful. As a parent, I do not want my daughters forming their opinions about all sorts of social and political issues by absorbing them from the wider society. I'd rather they absorb them from members of a Catholic community.

Those are the reasons I personally believe that Catholic education is well-worth the investment. The reasons that other parents tell me when explaining their interest in our school include the Catholic elements I discussed, especially the community piece (voiced by parishioners and children of alumni), as well as specific Catholic religious instruction, the discipline that kids learn at a Catholic school (sometimes people reference the uniform). Some want to get away from bullying and hazing they have experienced in other schools. I think those are all good reasons to send kids to Catholic schools, and in particular, our school.

However, St. Francis de Sales is not necessarily the best choice for everyone. The fact is that because of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the public-school district can and does invest more resources into special education and educating students with disabilities than we can at St. Francis. Still, for the vast majority of students, I believe St. Francis School is the ideal option.

A Plea for the Importance of Catholic Education

I don't think we've been continually making the case for the essentiality of Catholicism as well as we could be. In 2007, two psychologists, one from Princeton and one from Stanford published a journal article titled, "Psychological Essentialism of Human Categories." In it, the authors identified all the ways in which we categorize ourselves and others, and determined which categories we use to ground our identity, and to determine who we interact with and befriend. The top five categories that were highly essential were, in order: gender, ethnicity, race, disability, and age. Religion was 8th, right beneath sexual orientation and language. So that is the average innate human nature of wider society.

Now to compare that with what we believe, I'll use Galatians 3:28. "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Jesus Christ." And more recently and locally, *All for One and One for All in Jesus Christ.* That is the call and the challenge: to make our parish our most important community and choosing the parish school is one way of doing that. Remember that Jesus wants us to have a personal relationship with Him, but also He wants us to have a relationship with the Church and each other. John 13: 34-35 says, "A new commandment I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so also you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you love one another." You can only give and receive God's love in community with others!

Invitation

So thank you very much for hearing my plea for Catholic education. I want to end with an invitation if you believe in the value of Catholic education as I do. If you have a school-aged child, I invite you to consider sending them to the parish school. If you know of other people, parishioners, neighbors, friends, relatives...I invite you to encourage them to consider sending their kids to the parish school. The school appreciates the financial support of the parish, so please continue to be generous in your support. I'll end with Matthew 19:14, when Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."
