

KEEP HOLY THE SABBATH

There's no better way to deepen our Lenten practice than to review the Ten Commandments. The first three, having to do with our right relationship to God, get the most ink. The one we busy people probably have the most problem with is keeping holy the Sabbath.

If we take this commandment literally, babies will go undiapered and dishes will stay on the table, or perhaps meals will not be served. The sick will go unattended and nothing that has anything to do with physical labor will be done. Is mental labor really work? How about changing that dirty diaper (poor baby!)?

We need to depend on God to discern how to observe real Sabbath time in our lives. The point of this commandment is that God has given us a great gift: one whole day per week when we are free to rest, worship God, sing, feast, love, and rejoice. As Psalm 19 proclaims: "The law of the LORD is perfect, / refreshing the soul" (19:8). Our Sabbath rest is a great gift, to be received from God with joy.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

If your parish is reading from Year B of the Lectionary today, and not Year A, as is normally done when there are elect present for the scrutinies and preparing for Easter baptism, you hear about Jesus driving the money-changers from the temple. If you wished to get as close as possible to this site today, you would in fact be at a Muslim shrine, the Dome of the Rock, built on the ruins of Herod's temple. Archeologists believe that this striking, gold-domed crown of a shrine is set precisely where the Holy of Holies once was. Jews believe that the rock is the exact spot where Abraham was prepared to sacrifice Isaac. It is not a mosque, as some think, but a shrine, the oldest one in the Muslim world. For them, the rock is the place from which the Prophet Mohammed ascended on a visit to heaven. The Crusaders mistook the shrine for the actual Temple of Solomon, and the infamous Knights Templar used it as their headquarters and model for their churches elsewhere. The geometric perfection of the shrine is a mathematician's dream. The inscriptions are not exactly hospitable though, since they encourage Christians to "depart from error" and declare that "Jesus son of Mary was only a messenger of God." In ancient times, those who prayed here after walking around the rock were given a certificate entitling the bearer to admission to paradise. The ticket had to be

Usually I begin my letter to you on the Annual Appeal with a report on how we have done in this past year. But, this time I just want to tell you how grateful I am to each and every one of you for your help. My years as a pastor have taught me that the personal involvement and support of the pastors for the ACA is essential and I thank you for that. Now to where we stand. With two months still remaining in the 2017 Annual Catholic Appeal, over \$14.3 million has been raised to date, continuing the generous support of the people of God in the Archdiocese of Chicago. You are directly responsible for this year's success. Thank you!

Our Annual Catholic Appeal is framed in the words of Jesus: *Come, follow me.* It is an invitation to be Christ for others and to live in a community of discipleship. As Christ's community we help to sustain Catholic schools and parishes in need, support programs of religious education, ministerial formation, and promote the protection of life and peace and justice. Through the Annual Appeal, we together support the efforts of Catholic Relief Services that cares for people across the globe who struggle and suffer because of natural disasters.

It is tempting to take for granted the good will and commitment that people demonstrated during the previous years. But, that would be a mistake. Instead, I ask that you attend to the procedures that have been developed to insure a successful Annual Catholic Appeal again in 2018.

Since St. Francis de Sales elected to participate in the ACA Incentive Plan in 2017, your 2018 goal is reduced to 75% of your regular goal. Therefore, your 2018 goal is 4.5% of the previous year's offertory income.

Your offertory income for Fiscal Year 2016-2017 was \$2,036,797. Therefore, your target is \$91,656.

When parishioner contributions exceed the parish goal, St. Francis de Sales will receive a rebate of 100% of the funds donated over the goal.

ROME (CNS) -- Lent is a time for Christians to get their hearts in sync with the heart of Jesus, Pope Francis said.

"Let the Lord heal the wounds of sin and fulfill the prophecy made to our fathers: 'A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you; and I will take out of your flesh the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh,'" the pope said Feb. 14, celebrating Mass and distributing ashes at the beginning of Lent.

After a brief prayer at the Benedictine's Monastery of St. Anselm, Pope Francis made the traditional Ash Wednesday procession to the Dominican-run Basilica of Santa Sabina on Rome's Aventine Hill for the Mass.

He received ashes on his head from 93-year-old Cardinal Jozef Tomko, titular cardinal of the basilica, and he distributed ashes to the cardinals present, three Benedictines, three Dominicans, an Italian couple with two children and members of the Pontifical Academy for Martyrs, which promotes the traditional Lenten "station church" pilgrimage in Rome.

In his homily, he said the church gives Christians the 40 days of Lent as a time to reflect on "anything that could dampen or even corrode our believing heart."

Everyone experiences temptation, the pope said. Lent is a time to pause and step back from situations that lead to sin, a time to see how God is at work in others and in the world and, especially, a time to return to the Lord, knowing that his mercy is boundless.

Lent, he said, is a time "to allow our hearts to beat once more in tune with the vibrant heart of Jesus."

Hitting the reset button, the pope said, requires taking a pause from "bitter feelings, which never get us anywhere" and from a frantic pace of life that leaves too little time for family, friends, children, grandparents and God.

People need to pause from striving to be noticed, from snooty comments and "haughty looks," he said; instead, they need to show tenderness, compassion and even reverence for others.

"Pause for a little while, refrain from the deafening noise that weakens and confuses our hearing, that makes us forget the fruitful and creative power of silence," the pope said.

Use the pauses of Lent "to look and contemplate," he suggested. Christians can learn from seeing the gestures others make that "keep the flame of faith and hope alive."

"Look at faces alive with God's tenderness and goodness working in our midst," the pope said, pointing to the faces of families who struggle to survive yet continue to love, the wrinkled faces of the elderly "that reflect God's wisdom at work" and the faces of the sick and their caregivers who "remind us that the value of each person can never be reduced to a question of calculation or utility."

"See the remorseful faces of so many who try to repair their errors and mistakes, and who from their misfortune and suffering, fight to transform their situations and move forward," Pope Francis said.

But most of all, he said, "see and contemplate the real face of Christ crucified out of love for everyone, without exception. For everyone? Yes, for everyone. To see his face is an invitation filled with hope for this Lenten time, in order to defeat the demons of distrust, apathy and resignation.

The invitation, he said, is to "return without fear to those outstretched, eager arms of your Father, who is rich in mercy, who awaits you."

"Return without fear to join in the celebration of those who are forgiven," the pope said. "Return without fear to experience the healing and reconciling tenderness of God."

DEACON'S CORNER, FEBRUARY 20, 2018

The following reflection was offered by Deacon John Sfire, Parishioner and Deacon at St. Francis de Sales.

"Why put off 'til tomorrow what you can do today?"
"There's no better time than right now to get the job done."
"Let's take advantage of today since we don't know what tomorrow will bring."

How many times in our lives have we heard these expressions? I am sure, like myself, you have heard them many, many times. And what do we do when we hear these expressions or some type of expression that resembles the above? I am going to go out on a limb and say that, like myself, many times we don't take advantage of the opportunity to "get it done now as opposed to waiting for another time." This concept, this idea, this phrase is something that has kind of become part of our lives. I know it has for me. And remember, I am not judging anyone with my reflections, but offer the opportunity to look more deeply into our own lives to see how we might "live it better" by making a small change here or there.

Let's go back 2,000 years and look at Jesus Christ and His disciples. He began with twelve and that number continued to grow and grow over time, no matter how the Christians were persecuted and put to death for their beliefs in Our Lord and Savior. And unfortunately, that persecution and killing still goes on today all across the globe. I know living in the United States, we are somewhat protected from the ultimate extent of persecution and death due to our religious beliefs and yet, we see this going on everywhere around the world. The best thing we can do is to pray for our brothers and sisters daily in their plight to "serve the Lord." Looking back at Jesus Christ and His disciples, they must have been in a state of unknowing as to what was to happen to them.

Think about it. Jesus was walking along the shore by the sea and called out to men and said: "Come follow Me." And they did just that. They left what they were doing, they left their families, they left the life they had known for years to follow Jesus. And Jesus didn't give them some type of itinerary to follow, He didn't have some type of agenda for them to read, He just said: "Come follow Me." Even during His three year ministry, the disciples followed Jesus wherever He went. They didn't ask many questions of Jesus, they just followed Him not knowing what the outcome might be during this time. Jesus wasn't very explanatory as to what they had to do prior to His death and Resurrection. And when Jesus appeared to them in the upper room after He had died on the Cross, He said to them: "go out and teach ye all nations." And Jesus had the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove come down from Heaven and be with them all the days of their lives, just as Jesus has done for us.

So now look at our Christian lives in comparison. From the time of our birth, we have had parents, teachers in school, priests on the altar, etc. all helping us to understand and live the life Jesus Christ has laid out for all of us to follow. And yet with all of this information put in front of us all the days of our lives, we still have trouble "following in the footsteps of Jesus." So I say to us all, now is the time to make a change in our lives. This Season of Lent gives us the opportunity each and every year to adapt a change that should not last just 40 days. It should last the rest of our lives, however long that might be. I know we see the three aspects of Lent being Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving as the basis of having a "good Lent," but I think we can expand on these three aspects well beyond the 40 days that the Church has professed and suggested for us to follow since I can remember. Do something that will have meaning in your life, meaning in the lives of others around you. After all, we continue to go through changes each and every day as I have written about so many times in the past. So let's make a change that will have great meaning for us and our future spiritual development.

Think about what changes you might commit to this Lenten Season and I promise you that you will be happy you did. My blessings to all,


NEW COORDINATOR NEEDED FOR LAST YEAR AT THE HABERSTROH FARM!


