



## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The Paschal Mystery is the key to our Christian faith: the dying and rising of Jesus that is the pattern of our life. In their first steps on the road of faith, the catechumens feel the cross of glory traced over their eyes, on their lips, across their shoulders, on their ears, over their heart, and on their feet. The mystery is that even death gives way to life for those who are held in the embrace of Jesus. Today, many new Christians arise from the waters of the font. Yet the font is not the destination of their journey. The goal is Pentecost, fifty days from now, and a lifetime of praise to the Father, in Christ, in the embrace of the Holy Spirit, for the sake of the world. "Neophyte," our ancient word for newly-baptized people, means "newly-planted" in Greek. If someone in your parish has just been baptized, welcome them today. The smiles on their faces and the light in the eyes is a foretaste of heaven.

## EASTER MESSAGE FROM CARDINAL CUPICH

Dear Sisters and Brothers in the Risen Lord Jesus,

The news today seems to be dominated by death-dealing forces and foreclosed possibilities. This past year has brought us a plague of gun-violence, streams of helpless refugees in different parts of the world, struggles in our own nation around questions of immigration and racism, countless victims of natural disasters, and large numbers of people who are—in the words of Pope Francis—"discarded." There seems to be scant room for hope and optimism.

Yet, we know by our own experience as believers and our common bonds of faith that this is not the full story of reality. There, indeed, is other news, the good news of our Easter faith. Christ has conquered all death and evil. Christ is risen!

When we profess our faith in the risen Lord, we do not deny the pain and suffering at work in our world. The risen Christ himself bears his wounds of his suffering, but he is risen. He has conquered sin and death, and our victory is certain. We hold a great hope in him who leads forward. But, it does not end there, for as St. Paul tells us, all of that we celebrate in these days has taken place so that we "might live no longer for ourselves but for him who died for our sakes and was raised."

In the Archdiocese of Chicago, our commitment to *Renew My Church* means that we take our Easter faith seriously to the point that it becomes the source of new energy for communities and individuals who share our faith with the world and bring it hope the world cannot take away.

May our faith in the Risen Lord be alive in our hearts, and may we share that gift widely and generously with others.

# WHAT IS DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY AND WHY IS IT ON APRIL 8, THE WEEK AFTER EASTER?


The Divine Mercy Sunday Prayer Service will begin at 3 p.m. at St. Francis de Sales Parish Church. Confessions will be available after the 12:30 p.m. Mass and again after the 3 p.m. prayer service until the 5 p.m. Mass. All are welcome.

## Why is there Divine Mercy Sunday?

Jesus appeared to St. Faustina Kowalska for the first time on Feb. 22, 1931 and gave her His first revelation about His Divine Mercy. Jesus' message is that He desires mankind to avail itself to the infinite mercy of God on earth. That is why he wanted the first Sunday after Easter to be Divine Mercy Sunday. This is not a feast day invented in the Middle Ages or thought up by the Vatican. This is a special feast because it is one asked for by Jesus Himself!

## How do we avail ourselves to this Divine Mercy?

Jesus will give us complete forgiveness of sins and punishments if we do a few simple tasks. We are asked to attend Mass and receive Holy Communion on Divine Mercy Sunday. We also should say the Divine Mercy Chaplet and venerate the Divine Mercy Image on Divine Mercy Sunday. A good confession must be made 20 days before or after



Divine Mercy Sunday. Not much to ask for when you consider that you receive forgiveness of sins and remission of punishment!

## Why did God give us the Feast of Divine Mercy?

Jesus said to St. Faustina, "I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender Mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My Mercy. The soul that goes to Confession and receives Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the Divine floodgates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near Me, even though its sins be scarlet. My Mercy is so great that no mind, be it man or angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it is solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the fount of My Mercy." (St. Faustina Diary 699)

## **Easter and Divine Mercy Sunday**

Easter is the day that we celebrate the triumphant Jesus Christ who sacrificed His life for us and then rose from the dead. On Divine Mercy Sunday, we again are given a view of Jesus as the loving Savior. The Divine Mercy Image Painting hangs in our church on the south wall. Jesus told St. Faustina to have this image painted. It shows the red and white rays of His blood and water. He also told her to have the words, "Jesus I trust in you" written across the bottom. If you want God's Mercy, trust in Jesus' message and join us April 3rd at 3 p.m.

## 5 REASONS TO ATTEND CHURCH REGULARLY

I believe that going to church is something that is extremely valuable, is extremely important, and is something that should be practiced by anyone who claims to be a follower of Christ. Not counting the times that you might miss for vacation or sickness or a particular work commitment, you should be in church. Church is not something that you do individually, it is something that you do collectively. To be a follower of Christ is not something that you do by yourself, it is something that you do together with other people. We are what the Bible calls the "family of God." A family is by its very nature inter-dependent. To be a part of a local church means that you're inter-dependent with other people in your church. There are strong reasons why you should come to church regularly.

## IT IS WHAT JESUS DID

Luke 14:6 says, "Jesus went back to Nazareth, where he'd been brought up and as usual he went to the meeting place on the Sabbath." The Bible tells us that "as usual," or another translation of the Bible says "as was His custom," Jesus went to the place of worship. This is in keeping with obeying one of the Ten Commandments, which is, "Observe the Sabbath by keeping it holy." When we say we are followers of Christ, we're supposed to do what Jesus has done. What would Jesus do? Jesus would go to church and we as followers of Christ should do the same. If we take seriously our followership of Christ, then we should go to Church regularly.

## IT IS A GOOD HABIT

Hebrews 10:25 says, "Some people have gotten out of the habit of meeting for worship. But we must not do that. We should keep on encouraging each other, especially since you know that the day of the Lord's coming is getting closer." The Bible says to us there is a good habit of regularly going to church. Most of the time when we think of habits we think bad habits, but there are good habits. Some have developed the bad habit of missing church. Maybe you've gotten out of the habit or maybe you have yet to develop the habit of regular church attendance. Sunday morning offers a lot of options. It offers the sleep-in option, the brunch option, the read-the-Sunday-paper option, and all kinds of options having to do with recreation. Good habits bless your life and produce positive results. When you practice the good habit of regular church attendance, you reap some very good results.

## IT IS A POSITIVE EXAMPLE

Going to church is a positive example. When you go each Sunday, you're setting an example that other people notice. It is an example that becomes an inspiration for others. People who are trying to make their lives better, who want a positive change, are going to be impacted by an example of someone who is committed to regular church attendance. For those of you who are married, it's a positive example to your spouse. For those of you with children, it's an absolutely positive example for your kids to know that on Sunday, you go to church. For the people around you, whether friends, co-workers, or family, when they see that you have a commitment that is leading you to living a better life—that is a positive example that other people can follow.

## IT IS IMPORTANT FOR FELLOWSHIP

Look again at what the Bible says, "Some have gotten out of the habit. We should not do that. We should keep on encouraging each other." The church is an encouraging place. We all need encouragement. Life is hard. Life is difficult. We all run into various kinds of challenges: health problems, financial issues, conflict within our families. We have an opportunity to encourage one another and that is part of what church is about. Sunday service is where fellowship begins. Being in classes, groups, and serving is where you get to know people on a deeper level. But it starts on Sunday; the launching point to fellowship and community is in church services. Every Sunday that you come, there are going to be people who are looking for you, wondering if you're there. People will miss you. And the longer and more consistently you come, the more you will be missed. It is a marvelous thing to be a part of a local church, it is like having a much larger family.

Don't come occasionally to church. Don't just come when you feel like it. Make regular church attendance your first priority and let it be a good habit that becomes a part of who you are. Nothing does more for your spiritual health than regularly being in church. Being a church service is irreplaceable. It is a moment in time and once it's gone, it's gone forever.

Our local troops research a country and create a table with posters, activities and tasty treats from that country. Each year we invite Girls Scouts from neighboring towns to join us. This year we had just over 200 girls and we collected just as many food items for the pantry, as each girl was required to donate one item. By allowing us to use Fr. Valker Hall, we are able to provide the girls with a fun, affordable international experience.

We would like to thank Father Ryan for providing us the use of these facilities which have enabled us to put on these events and many others that serve our 400+ Girl Scouts here in Lake Zurich.




