

SAVED BY THE ONE WHO WAS REJECTED

Some city teenagers often scorn and reject farm kids. Yet it's no exaggeration to say that humanity owes its life to farmers who care for the world's crops and livestock. This week's scriptures remind us that Jesus was as rejected as a shepherd, a farm boy, yet we owe our very lives to him.

In this Sunday's reading from the Acts of the Apostles Peter tells the people that salvation comes through Jesus Christ, the one who was rejected. In John's letter we hear that we have become God's beloved children through Jesus, whom the world did not know. Lastly, in the Gospel Jesus describes himself as the Good Shepherd who "lays down his life for the sheep" (John 10:11). Will you join Jesus in laying down your life for God's beloved flock?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Most languages take the name for this fifty-day season from the Lord's Passover: Pasqua in Italian, Pâques in French, Paach in Dutch, Pascha in Greek and Russian. English has a much newer name, the name of a pagan goddess, Eoster. For centuries before Christianity took hold, in both Germany and Britain the spring equinox was dedicated to her and the concepts of fertility and rebirth. She was said to be a playful spirit, following the Sun King's chariot, and ending the reign of winter. She had a magical companion, a rabbit who hid eggs in the fields to coax plants and animals to rebirth. It was believed that Eoster once came across a bird with broken wings and saved it by turning it into a rabbit—an egg-laying rabbit at that! Although they were baptized, most people didn't take to the new Latin name (Pascha Domini) too easily, and kept calling the spring equinox by the old accustomed name. For good measure, they kept a pagan name for Christmas, too: Yule.

POPE TELLS YOUNG PEOPLE 'NOT TO BE QUIET' By Cindy Wooden, Catholic News Service, March 26, 2018

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Celebrating Palm Sunday Mass with thousands of young people, Pope Francis urged them to continue singing and shouting "hosanna" in the world, proclaiming the lordship of Jesus and following his example of outreach to the poor and suffering.

The crowd that shouted "hosanna" as Jesus entered Jerusalem included all those for whom Jesus was a source of joy, those he healed and forgave, and those he welcomed after they had been excluded from society, the pope said in his homily March 25.

But others were irritated by Jesus and tried to silence his followers, the pope said. In the same way, people today will try to silence young people who continue to follow Jesus, because "a joyful young person is hard to manipulate."

"There are many ways to silence young people and make them invisible," the pope said. There are "many ways to anesthetize them, to make them keep quiet, ask nothing, question nothing. There are many ways to sedate them, to keep them from getting involved, to make their dreams flat and dreary, petty and plaintive."

Pope Francis asked the young people "not to keep quiet. Even if others keep quiet, if we older people and leaders keep quiet, if the whole world keeps quiet and loses its joy, I ask you: Will you cry out?"

Gabriella Zuniga, 16, and her sister Valentina Zuniga, 15, were among the thousands in St. Peter's Square. The sisters, students at Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, had participated March 24 in the local Rome "March for Our Lives," calling for gun control.

The Palm Sunday Mass marked the local celebration of World Youth Day and included the more than 300 young adults who, at the Vatican's invitation, had spent a week discussing the hopes, desires and challenges facing the world's young people and ways the Catholic Church should respond.

At the end of the Mass, they formally presented their final document to the pope; it will be used, along with input from the world's bishops' conferences, in drafting the working document for the Synod of Bishops in October, which will focus on young people, faith and vocational discernment.

Holding five-foot tall palm branches, the young adults led the procession to the obelisk in the center of St. Peter's Square. They were joined by others carrying olive branches and by bishops and cardinals holding "palmurelli," which are intricately woven palm fronds.

In his homily, Pope Francis said that the Palm Sunday Mass, which begins with the singing of "hosanna" and then moves to the reading of Jesus' passion, combines "stories of joy and suffering, mistakes and successes, which are part of our daily lives as disciples."

The acclamation of the crowd praising Jesus as he enters Jerusalem gives way to the shouts of "crucify him" as Jesus' suffering and death draw near, the pope noted. "It somehow expresses the contradictory feelings that we too, the men and women of today, experience: the capacity for great love, but also for great hatred; the capacity for courageous self-sacrifice, but also the ability to 'wash our hands.'"

The Gospel also demonstrates how the joy Jesus awakened in some is "a source of anger and irritation for others," Pope Francis said, and the same is true today.

Joy is seen in all those "who had followed Jesus because they felt his compassion for their pain and misery," the pope said. "How could they not praise the one who had restored their dignity and hope? Theirs is the joy of so many forgiven sinners who are able to trust and hope once again."

But others in Jerusalem, "those who consider themselves righteous and 'faithful' to the law and its ritual precepts" and "those who have forgotten the many chances they themselves had been given" find such joy intolerable, the pope said.

"How hard it is for the comfortable and the self-righteous to understand the joy and the celebration of God's mercy," he said. "How hard it is for those who trust only in themselves, and look down on others, to share in this joy."

The shouts of "crucify him" did not begin spontaneously, the pope said, but were incited by those who slandered and gave false witness against Jesus, "'spinning' facts and painting them such that they disfigure the face of Jesus and turn him into a 'criminal.'"

Theirs, he said, was "the voice of those who twist reality and invent stories for their own benefit, without concern for the good name of others" and "the cry of those who have no problem in seeking ways to gain power and to silence dissonant voices."

Pope Francis told the young people gathered in the square that in the face of such attempts to demolish hope, kill dreams and suppress joy, Christians must look to Christ's cross and "let ourselves be challenged by his final cry. He died crying out his love for each of us: young and old, saints and sinners, the people of his times and of our own."

"We have been saved by his cross, and no one can repress the joy of the Gospel," he said. "No one, in any situation whatsoever, is far from the Father's merciful gaze."

EASTER GIVES US HOPE, NOT JUST OPTIMISM Cardinal Cupich's Column, Chicago Catholic,

I was once asked to explain the difference between optimism and hope. My response was to point to the transformation that take place in the disciples after the Resurrection.

Prior to the death of Jesus, it is not too much to say that the disciples were optimistic. Some of them were banking on Jesus being the Messiah who would secure their earthly futures. Remember Mrs. Zebedee who asked Jesus to put her sons James and John at his right and left?

Then of course there was Judas, who eventually became disenchanted after Jesus made it clear he was not concerned with mundane success and power, even to the point of talking about being rejected and put to death. Yet, the dreams of these optimistic disciples evaporated at Calvary to the point that they scurried off in hiding. They were crestfallen and afraid.

With the Resurrection of Jesus, they were not called to a new optimism but to real hope. Optimism is an attitude that tries to bridge the gap between the present and the future. We have aspirations in the present moment about what can develop in the days ahead. Hope, however, closes the gap between the present and the future by making the future a present reality, as we see in the appearances of the risen Jesus.

The hope given to the disciples that their death also will be overcome was not a matter of wishful thinking. They actually experienced it as a present reality in the appearances of Jesus. This is why hope is called a theological virtue. It accomplishes that which is hoped for, actual union with God, which is already taking place in the present in some way.

In a word, while optimism is an attitude, hope is a reality, for the hope to be fulfilled in the future is already present. Unlike mere optimism, the distance between the present and the future is overcome. Optimism has to wait for future developments in human activity to occur. But hope trusts that God, who is present to us, is already fulfilling the promises made.

With optimism, that which is promised or wished for may or may not occur. But with hope there is certainty that the promise not only will be fulfilled but is already being fulfilled in our time, even though we do not see or perceive it.

Pope Francis often speaks of hope. He is a man of hope, rather than a man of optimism. He firmly believes that Christ, risen from the dead, is presently active and working to fulfill all that God has promised.

The fathers of the Second Vatican Council were particularly insistent that this foundational belief of the church receive greater attention in our day. They reminded us that Christ is always present in the church working to accomplish all the Father has sent him to do ("Sacrosanctum Concilium," 6 and 7). This is the source of our hope, not human accomplishment or development.

If we look only at what humanity is doing, there is room for both pessimism and optimism. We fail at so much, and we succeed at so much. But life can go either way if human effort is the measure of history.

Easter changed all this, as Jesus broke the barrier between time and eternity, joining the present with the future, so that all that God has ever promised is already in some way being fulfilled in our day. We do not have to wait until we die to enjoy the fruits of Christ's death and resurrection. We can do so now as people of hope, who say Christ is Risen, and so are we.
