

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The origins of today's solemnity lie in thirteenth-century Belgium. In those days, people seldom received Holy Communion, and never from the chalice. A nun in a troubled convent, Juliana of Liège, devoted her life to stirring up love for the Eucharist, lobbying for a feast day to honor the Blessed Sacrament with Masses and processions.

Juliana may have been inspired by the Ascension Day processions in nearby Bruges. Crusaders brought a treasure home to Bruges from Constantinople in 1204: a reliquary said to contain a cloth from Joseph of Arimathea with which he had helped prepare the body of Jesus for burial. The stain on the cloth was said to be the holy blood itself, and so the people of Bruges built a great basilica to house the relic. Bruges became a great center of pilgrimage because of this treasure, and the procession of the Holy Blood is still one of the greatest festivals in Belgium today. The bishop carries the relic through the narrow streets, and the people wear medieval costumes and act out scenes from the Bible.

EMMAUS HOUSE OF HOSPITALITY IN ITS 18TH YEAR OF MINISTRY

On the weekend of May 19-20, Brian Pozzi, President of the Board of Directors of Emmaus House, offered the following testimony about the ministry and its current need for volunteers.

A little over a year ago, we at Emmaus House had the privilege of providing a mass announcement about our ministry. We are blessed to have the opportunity to do so again.

If you are new to the parish, or simply need a refresher, allow me to provide a brief description of what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters.

Each Sunday night, with a few exceptions, right below us in Father Valker Hall we provide a community dinner and perishable food pantry for those who face difficulties with feeding themselves and their families. The dinners themselves are generously provided by various groups looking for outreach opportunities such as: St. Francis de Sales ministries, parish groups, civic groups, businesses, area churches and school organizations.

We hand out dairy, meat, bread and produce to our guests in the harvest room following dinner. This bounty is designed to help our guests make it through the week more comfortably until our dinner the following week. The food is donated by our generous retail partners in the area, such as Costco, Jewel, Mariano's, Trader Joe's just to name a few. Our volunteers go out to each of these establishments each week to rescue this food that we provide in the harvest room.

In addition to Sunday dinner and food pantry, Emmaus House also sponsors other important programs for our guests including: Jeepers Sneakers, which provides back to school shoes for children, Undie Sunday which distributes new underwear and socks for school age children.

Emmaus does other important work in our community. For example, in the past year, we have provided funding to pay rents, mortgages and utilities for people in danger of losing their homes or apartments. This critical funding provides people with much needed time to get back on their feet financially and to stay in their residencies. These are just a few of the examples of the great things that the Emmaus House does each week.

As always, thank you to all who have volunteered or supported Emmaus House in any way by giving of your time, talents, resources and prayers. We could not do this without everyone's help and we should be proud of this as parishioners in the Lord's work.

Last year, we asked for additional support for our mission and the Lord answered our prayers. We were invigorated by new members of Emmaus House who work at our dinners, or rescue food, or serve on our Board or in some amazing cases, do all of the above. We are so grateful for the extra sets of hands, hearts and minds. It is truly a blessing.

As is often the case, when one door opens, another door closes. As we have welcomed new members to our group, we have also seen members who have served for years move on. We are still in need of new volunteers.

We need leaders who can help us continue to run Emmaus House smoothly. The good news is we have a great program set up by our founders. It's our job to continue what they have put in place. You can help as little as you want or as much as you want. Specifically, we need dinner coordinators – the commitment is one month a year – usually four Sundays to work with the host groups who provide the food and volunteers. This is a great opportunity for one person or two or more friends to do it together. All training and hand holding will be cheerfully provided. Another opportunity is to be Emmaus representative/coordinator for Rock the Block – for a second year Emmaus is the recipient of raffle proceeds that will help us fund our important community projects. Still another opportunity is social media coordinator – we feel that we need to reach out to our community and share the news about our organization. There are many more short or long term projects. The message is simply this. If you feel that you want to lend a hand, we will find a way for you to help as little or as much as you would like and fits your desires.

Finally, we cannot say it enough, on behalf of the entire Emmaus House, "Thank you Father Ryan for your support of our ministry." We could not continue to function without your blessing. This past year we became a recipient of the raffle proceeds for Rock the Block. We would not be fortunate enough to have that benefit without the partnership and support of Father Ryan and all of you in the parish.

Thank you again Father Ryan and thank you all for your support and for listening to our request for further help.

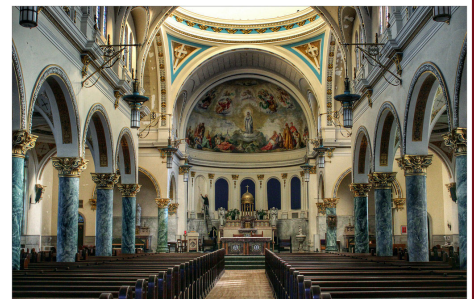

DEACON'S CORNER—May 22, 2018

This past Sunday we celebrated the Feast of Pentecost, which occurs fifty days after Easter. It symbolizes the last time the disciples of Jesus would see Him on earth. And as we all know, Jesus fulfilled His promise when He said to the disciples: "I will be with you until the end of the ages." I imagine that when Jesus told them that He will be with them for all times, they were a bit confused when they met and Jesus told them He would no longer be with them physically. That is when Jesus called upon the Holy Spirit to come down in the form of tongues of fire to dwell within the disciples enabling them to "go out and teach ye all nations."

For me, many times when I am reading the same gospels over and over, I seem to get more out of the readings than the time before. I am not sure what I can attribute that to except my continual asking of Our Lord to "empower me with the guidance of the Holy Spirit to be a better Catholic, better Christian, better deacon and a better person." And I believe that in order to do that we must read the Scriptures over and over again. Perhaps you have the same experience. Do you ever find yourself getting more out of certain readings than you may have in the past?

If you do, that is good. You see, in today's complex society, we all need help, we need answers, we need understanding about what takes place on a daily basis. And sometimes there are no answers, there is no help, there is no understanding of what continues to take place in our lives. One thing that has been brought to my mind so dramatically this past week are the two high school shootings, two of the seven taken place in 2018 alone. In every Mass this past week and week-end, Fr. Ryan asked us to pray for the victims, their families and friends, for their lives will never be the same. And in some ways, we are all affected by these senseless tragedies. We worry about our children and grandchildren's safety, and we pray for those victimized by these tragedies.

The most important thing to remember about Pentecost is that we are all disciples of Our Lord. When Jesus met for the last time with His disciples and the Holy Spirit came down upon them, Jesus was showing all of us that the Holy Spirit is to dwell within us all. And that we are all blessed to "go out and teach ye all nations". We are all to profess the Word of God. We are all to live the Word of God. While I know this is easier said than done, we must do our best to be an example to all those around us, not just in our own family, but in school, our workplace and even to strangers on the street. I know I say that a lot in my DCs, but being an example to others is the best way to "walk in His shoes."

You might say; "Deacon John, we cannot walk in the shoes of Jesus," but I disagree. Even though you might say we are human, we are sinners, that is the exact reason Jesus did come down to walk among us and suffered the agonizing death of the Cross. Why? So that our sins will be forgiven. All we have to do is ask His forgiveness. He will never say no.

Now could be a good time to say that going forward in our lives, "this is the first day of the rest of my life." A day that we can make some changes in our example toward others, most importantly in our own families. Remember that children are like sponges. They absorb all that we put in front of them, good or not-so-good. So let's strive going forward to be "all good" in what we present as an example, especially to our children. If we do, perhaps the tragedies that continue to occur in our lives will diminish.

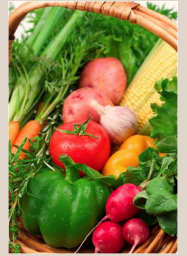

I have started an everlasting friendship with him that I can't imagine ending. I remember when my aunt passed away I started to lose faith in him. "Why did this have to happen to me? Her family? Our family? She didn't deserve it, and I'm sure none of us did." Through the troubled times I started to let

God go. When my uncle passed away I thought it was God messing with me. I turned away and blamed; I did exactly what I shouldn't of. As you know, at St. Francis we go to mass almost every Wednesday. Through I didn't like to admit it at first, these masses helped. Over time I grew back to God, and strengthened a life-long friendship. I am able to look at him at a time of need as well as for prayer. Thanks to St. Francis, I am now able to have a better understanding of my faith as well as religious duties.

I can understand why some people would be deterred from St. Francis. Yes, it seems like the perfect school, but it definitely isn't free. If it was free, I can't imagine why some wouldn't want to attend! Though, as I've stated before, the doors of St. Francis are open to *all* people regardless! We offer advanced classes such as geometry which is often taught in grades nine to ten! And most importantly, we celebrate our faith! In all grades first through eighth, we are taught religion as one of our everyday classes. Instead of hiding from our faith, we acknowledge and celebrate it! So yeah, it may be expensive, but I'm speaking from experience when I say it is definitely worth it!

Throughout my experiences at St. Francis, I've learned to love and grow accustomed to the ways of this school. This school has given me the opportunity to learn and grow. Without St. Francis, I don't know if I ever would've made it through the eighth grade. Point being, this school—as well as parish—is a second home to me. I've always felt welcome, safe, and appreciated. As the saying so famously goes, "All for one and one for all, in Jesus Christ."
