

### THE EUCHARISTIC FEAST

Some things about human nature don't change, even over the course of centuries. When we celebrate a holiday, we have a meal; when we celebrate a significant event, we have a feast. In today's first reading, Lady Wisdom is setting a feast, a sign of celebrating the covenant that Israel has with God. Israel's remembrance of its saving Exodus covenant is the Passover meal. 

# Parish Pastoral Council Minutes of May 22, 2018 Meeting Ministry Center – Fr. Joseph Firnbach Meeting Room

Father Ryan began the meeting at 7pm with the Renew My Church prayer for the Archdiocese and our parish.

### 1. Fix-it Together Campaign

- a. A progress report for the Ministry Center was distributed which explained how Martin Enterprises Heating and Air Conditioning has successfully broken down, removed, and disposed of the existing 20-ton fan coil, in-line heaters and condenser. The new equipment is in place and the ducting has been completed. We expect to complete the final connections for controls, electric, gas, drain, and refrigerant lines in May.
- b. We have locked in costs for the following areas that still need to be completed: Remaining paved areas, Ministry Center HVAC units, demo and remediation of the old church building, and new flooring for the church. The blueprints for the new storage garage are complete. It will have brown vinyl siding and a trench foundation, and we expect to have a building permit in two to three weeks. There are three sites on the parish grounds that are being considered for the location based on utilities and cost. We are planning to use some of the old bricks to make a cross monument in remembrance of the first parish church. Our next step is to redo the flooring in the church and complete the back parking lot. Overall, this plan is expected to be completed in a year and a half.

### 2. Parish School

- a. St. Francis de Sales parish school currently has 307 students enrolled for the 2018-2019 school year. With a rate of more than one new student registering per week, we estimate there to be about 325 students enrolled before school begins.
- b. The four visions for the future were presented and described by Principal Kyle Schmitt. The first goal is to have a guaranteed and viable curriculum that is visible to all. The second is to clearly communicate to prospective families that St. Francis de Sales possesses a strong family culture that is apparent in the parish school. The third goal is to further strengthen the math program. The last vision presented was to have a new round of constituent feedback that will be reviewed by a new board next year for strategic planning.
- c. Everyone unanimously acknowledged the outstanding first year of our Principal who is leading the school to continued success built on the previous success of principals, teachers, religious sisters, families and pastors since 1956. Also, we recognized the large strides made at the school to implement safety measures for the children and faculty. Safety and security is an on-going priority.

### 3. Youth Ministry/Teen Life

a. Pam Lynch discussed changes to the Confirmation program. The program is shifting from a modified Life Teen program to a DVD discussion based program. This way, if a student cannot attend a class, they will still be able to watch the DVD and learn the lesson. The program is moving towards a more active, engaging curriculum that everyone is very excited about. For first year Confirmation students, we are going to participate in the Archdiocese event, Holy Fire, to start out the year. This program includes faith speakers, bands and even lunch with Cardinal Cupich. For second year Confirmation students, we are rearranging the retreat dates so all of the students will attend the Castle retreat in the beginning of the year, so they can dive into deeper discussions about their faith as the year progresses. Pam also proposed moving the Confirmation class time from after mass to before mass, which clears up any conflict with Life Teen events.

### 4. Religious Education

- a. Mimi McGlauchlin presented the highlights for Religious Education. The grand total of students enrolled in Religious Education is 616 students. We had eight children in our Children's Catechumenate program. 108 children (2nd graders and Children's Catechumenate) received their First Reconciliation in February where we had Fr. DeGall and Fr. Fortunado here to assist Fr. Ryan in the church. Also, we have had 100 second grade students receive the sacrament of First Communion in May and June. We saw great results from the worship music Josh Goodman brought to the program with the children. Josh also sang at our Family Mass on April 23<sup>rd</sup>, and it was great to hear the children sing songs they had learned from the previous classes. Laurie Haas joined the Religious Education team in March 2018 to take on the position of Administrative Assistant, and Laurie has been helping in the office planning and leading the middle school classes. Mary Jo Kunzman and Rebecca Gabrione were also vital in making the whole program run smoothly.
- b. Looking towards the future, the Religious Education program is trying to bridge middle school and high school. We discussed how we have to meet the children where they are in their spiritual process and journey with them. We will be using the Edge program for our middle school curriculum in the new school year. This program used out of the box activities to relate to teachings of the church, which have led to great results. The Religious Education program will also focus on reaching the parents, as well as the children. Full cooperation is necessary to maximize the spiritual experience for the children.

### 5. Intentional Discipleship

- a. Judy Reilly explained the meaning of intentional discipleship and the steps of discipleship. The goal is to form intentional disciples, who are people who have given their life over to Jesus and are ACTIVELY pursuing Him in the midst of His Church. The steps to get to this point include a Making, Maturing and Missioning phase. We focused in on the making phase, defining it as the time where you are encountering Jesus. A main point Judy stressed was that one must bring people to Jesus, but we need to accompany them.
- b. Some highlights were mentioned, one of which being that we are blessed to have 45 parishioners enthusiastically commit to weekly 2-hour evening session from October to May with Equip. Also, the Called and Gifted Charism Workshop was held in April, and it discerned individual charisms to more

effectively build up the body of Christ. Another event, which had positive results across the board was the Threshold Conversations, 15 guests were invited from outside our parish to pair with a couple Equip members who listened to the guest's relationship (or lack of) with God. This event allowed Equip members to practice listening to another's story, be able to assess where that person is at in their faith journey, and be able to accompany them along the rest of their journey. Judy also mentioned the Second Generation Discipleship Vision as an upcoming event. This is the parish vision for addressing Archdiocese's Maturing and Missioning phases. This will be open to the whole parish and will run from October 2018 to March 2019 by Deacon Keith Strohm.

Fr. Ryan concluded the meeting at 9:45 p.m. with the Lord's Prayer.

Ryan, attended the Archdiocesan Pastoral Youth Council dinner and Mass at Our Lady of Mother of the Church Polish Mission in Willow Springs with Bishop John Manz.

These families are also involved and engaged in our parish in various ministries. They are Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, Catechists, PTO members, Great Bible Adventure participants, Intentional Discipleship Series participants, Parish School Board members, Parish Council members, and Life Teen Youth Ministry members.

Tino attends Carmel Catholic High School, Kelly attends Lake Zurich High School, and Michelle attends Stevenson High School. They are also active Peer Ministers and have been involved in the Life Teen Youth Ministry Program these past three years. They

were nominated by Fr. Ryan and Pam Lynch, Director of Young Adult and Youth Ministry, and accepted as representatives into the Archdiocesan Pastoral Youth Council (APYC).

The Archdiocese of Chicago selected three to five high school youth, from each of the six Vicariates in the Archdiocese. There are 55 parishes in Vicariate I and our parish has three of the five youth representing the entire Vicariate! The teens that were selected will serve as representatives on the Archdiocesan Pastoral Youth Council (APYC). This council will be discussing issues of faith relating to high school students. They will gather information from peers in their parish, school, and youth group settings regarding a specific topic designated by Cardinal Cupich. This feedback from the teens will be shared with the Cardinal and Director of Councils.

Starting in September, the teens that were accepted will serve a one year term on the APYC. They will meet four to five times a year at various locations throughout the Archdiocese.

Congratulations to Constantino, Kelly, and Michelle. We are proud of your intentional discipleship and awareness in your relationship with Jesus, to our faith, and representing our parish and Vicariate 1.

### THEOLOGY 101

# 'It's all the same God. Right, Father?'

There is an amazing assortment of religions and Christian denominations in the United States. Occasionally, when people are confronted by that pluralism, they say to me, "Well, Father, it's all the same God. Isn't it?" Usually, these are quick encounters in some social setting, for example, a wedding. I can't (and shouldn't) launch into a theology lecture. The best I can do is to say something to the effect, "In a general way, we are—as we believe—all heading home to the same God. But there are some really distinct and different ways that people understand God. In that sense, it's not all the same God." So much for my best efforts that probably don't register very clearly for my listeners.

When people use the word "God," they can mean very different realities. It stretches from a Deist understanding of God who, like a clockmaker, gets the world going and walks away to a highly involved God who turns out to be the many gods of Hinduism. The range is wide when it comes to naming and understanding God.

The Catholic Christian tradition knows God as revealed by Jesus Christ and as worshipped in the Church. In that tradition, we know and experience God in a distinct way. It's not possible to fully describe how we know and experience God, but perhaps we can identify a few important elements. As I do so, notice that I will name a series of contrasts. We know *something* about God, but we never fully *grasp* God. The best way to express that partial but important knowledge about God is through contrasts.

God, for example, is transcendent mystery. In other words, God is beyond us in every way. In the prophet Isaiah, God speaks, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor your ways my ways..." (Isaiah 55:8) And yet, God, who is transcendent mystery, is also present to us in a relationship that surpasses the intimacy of a nursing mother and child. (See Isaiah 49:14-16) Saint Augustine addressing God, says, "You are closer to me than I am to myself." And because God is both transcendent and close at hand, we have prayer that reflects both aspects—a prayer that "lifts the mind and heart up to God" and a prayer that is a close and familiar "talking with God."

Here is another contrast. God is the all-powerful creator of heaven and earth. We know of that from the very beginning of the Book of Genesis at the head of the entire Bible. And yet, this creator-God does not intrude in creation but is a subtle, even elusive, presence. The prophet Elijah, for example, didn't find God in the wind, fire, or earthquake

but rather in "a sound of sheer silence." (See 1 Kings 19:11-13) In that contrast, we experience the providential care of God all-powerful who creates and, at the same time, we experience our freedom and the freedom of all creation before this "non-intrusive" God.

We have come to know God as personal, in fact, as tri-personal Father, Son and Holy Spirit. And yet, this personal God is not a person as we ordinarily describe persons with



specific traits and personalities. When Moses asked for God's name, God said to Moses, "I am who I am." (See Exodus 3:13-14) Some have translated this as "I am who I will be." There is no pinning down this personal God with the particulars of human personalities.

Finally, we hold and believe in the "great contrast" in Jesus Christ, who is fully God and fully human. "Whoever has seen me has seen the Father," Jesus says to Philip. (See John 14:9) In him and in the mystery of his death and resurrection, God is revealed as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Even more, in the death and resurrection of Jesus we come to know God ultimately as love. "God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them." (1 John 4:16)

All these contrasts help us to talk about God. But our experience is much richer than stating things about God, we are already immersed in the very mystery of God that we profess. Here is a paraphrase of what we find in the Second Vatican Council's *Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World* (n. 24): "On the night before he died, when the Lord Jesus prayed 'That they may all be one, as we are one,' he opened up vistas closed to human reason and intimated that the union of God's sons and daughters in knowledge and love is already a sharing in the life of the Trinity."

These are some ways that we hold a distinctive understanding and experience of who God is for us. So, is it *all the same God?* For all of us, at the end of our earthly journey we will come before the same God. On that journey, however, we have come to know and experience our God in a distinct way through the grace and gift of revelation in Jesus Christ. And we hope and pray that all people would share that knowledge and experience with us.

### CATECHISTS-MENTORS-SMALL GROUP LEADERS NEEDED!

Throughout the school year, St Francis de Sales serves around 650 children from 3 years old to 8th grade in Religious Education and 350 teens who participate in Confirmation preparation, Sunday Life Nights, and various retreats. As Fr. Ryan reminds us, "All for one...one for all... in Jesus Christ." **These 1,000 young people NEED adults to share the love of Jesus with them.** 

Our Religious Education Ministry is a relational ministry, built on relationships. Children and teens need adults in their lives who are interested in building solid relationships with them and who will listen to them and value their opinions. These relationships are the key to children and teens feeling loved and accepted so that they can understand the love of God in practical ways. This is when real spiritual growth takes place in a person's life.

At the heart of Catechesis is a Person, the Person of Jesus Christ. To catechize is to share Christ's actions, words, and signs. Jesus walked with people, ate meals with them, and spent time with them. Jesus lived in relationship with others. This is our mission as the people of God, as the Church; His Church, to walk alongside our young people and to love them. Catechesis aims to put "people ... in communion ... with Jesus Christ: only He can lead us to the love of the Father in the Spirit and make us share in the life of the Holy Trinity." **If you want to share Jesus' love with children or teens and help raise up the next generation of disciples - this ministry might be for you.** 

We are looking for Catechists, Mentors, and Leaders for all ages. As a catechist, you will receive all the materials needed to lead the classes or small groups. Leaders attend meetings throughout the year to discuss and experience what is going to be taught or covered at each session.

As Pope Paul VI said, teens and adults are more willing to listen to a witness than they are to a teacher, and that if they do listen to a teacher, it is because they are witnesses.

How will we support you? What would your commitment look like?

### Preschool/Kindergarten and Grade School - "Finding God"

Preschool/Kindergarten and Grade School classes meet once a week, with the exception of the weeks of a school holiday or holy day. All instructional materials for each class session are provided. There will be a catechist meeting at the beginning of the year to introduce material, answer questions, and share ideas. Optional quarterly meetings will be offered to meet with your fellow teachers to learn more about your faith, share ideas and experiences, and to discuss what the next quarter will look like.

### Middle School - "EDGE" (New)

Middle school teens are a unique bunch. This is a critical age to really be intentional about the relationships they are building with Jesus and with others. We are very excited to be kicking off a brand new program called "EDGE." The focus of the program is to form bonds with and between the teens in order to create a faith based community. The topic will be introduced in a large, interactive, fun group setting. Teens will then break into small groups where they will have the opportunity to ask questions and discuss their thoughts with their peers and their leader. Instead of being talked at, the teens will be encouraged to actively engage in what their faith means to them. Middle School EDGE Nights are twice a month and meet on either a Monday or a Tuesday from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Catechists will receive all materials and information ahead of time so you are prepared for the session.

### **High School Confirmation - Chosen:**

Our high school freshmen and sophomores meet approximately once a month. Sessions start at 3:15 p.m. and end with attending 5 p.m. Mass. Adult leaders are needed to facilitate small groups. Our Confirmation preparation program has been renewed for this upcoming year. We will be following the Chosen program, within the Life Teen Youth Ministry experience, which uses a variety of speakers through a DVD series to introduce content and create topics for discussion.

Throughout the sessions together, the teens will be invited to ask questions and then spend time discussing the answers. Some of the first questions discussed will be: Why am I here? How do I know God is real? We want the teens to know that God created you, He loves them and He will never ignore or forget them. Sharing your faith with teens is one of the most important ways you can support them as they contemplate who God is and how He is relevant in their life.
