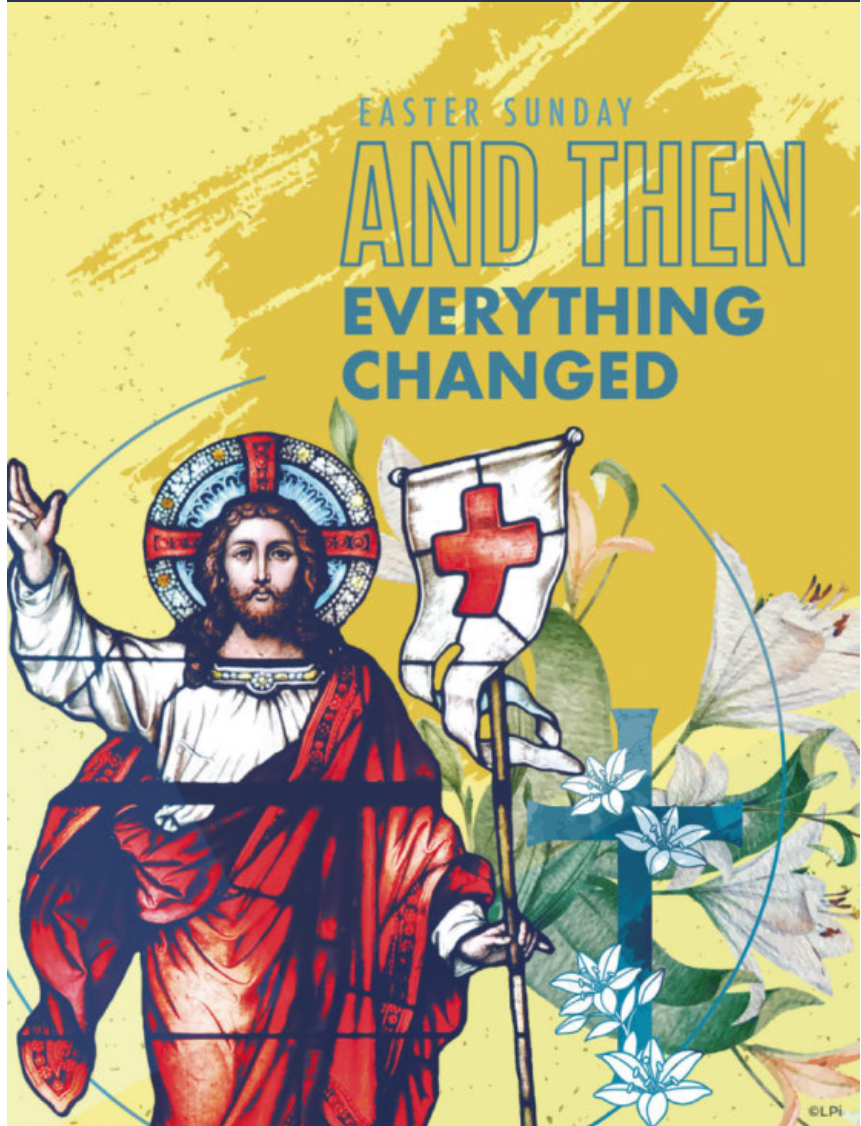

REJOICE AND BE GLAD

If Christmas is the "most wonderful time of the year," then Easter is the most joyous, glorious, awesome time of the year! Really? Today's readings don't exactly brim over with the kind of holiday cheer we find at Christmas—except for the responsorial psalm, which admittedly rings with gleeful joy. But otherwise, not so much. In the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, Peter gives a dry, condensed rendering of the story of Jesus to a group of Gentiles in Caesarea. The Colossians reading actually does have us looking forward to glory. Most underwhelming, though, is the Gospel proclamation of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. When we want to hear about angels and earthquakes and trumpets and glory, we hear about a dark, silent, empty tomb. This Easter Sunday story from John's Gospel is startling in its emptiness. Like Peter in the story, we must enter into this mystery.

Easter Sunday and Object Permanence

When you play peekaboo with a very young baby who has not yet developed object permanence, you actually feel kind of mean. As soon as your hands obscure your face, their little eyes widen with alarm and their expression crumbles into confusion and despair.

Because they can no longer see you, they believe you no longer exist. Their little brains are unable to understand that just because a thing cannot be seen, it is still there, still alive, still full of love and care and protection.

Aw, man, you can hear them thinking. I guess I don't have a mom anymore.

On Easter morning, Mary Magdalene sees the burial cloth but no body. Her human mind makes sense of the situation the best way it knows how, she assumes the Lord has been taken. I'm sure I would have thought the same thing, in her position.

She cannot conceive, on her own, the reality that Christ has risen from the dead. It doesn't matter that he has told his disciples again and again that this will happen. They weren't ready to understand then.

In many ways, Easter is when the human race really achieved object permanence. But we still struggle with it, don't we? I certainly do. So often I can be heard accusing God: "You weren't there. Where were you? I couldn't find you."

But I looked for him in the flesh. I looked for him in the stale yeast of the world — in money or success or affirmation or (worst of all) convenience and pleasure. Of course, I would not find him there, among the dead.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why are Catholics required to get married in a church, and not outside or at a different venue?

Answer:

Because the sacrament of marriage is a sacred covenant between the husband and wife, the celebration of the sacrament of matrimony is much more than simply a social or family event. So, the rule that the sacrament be celebrated in a church is a way to help reinforce the deeper meaning of Christian marriage. To help make this clearer, the Church's tradition also normally includes the celebration of the Mass when the marriage is being celebrated between two Catholics, and so a church or chapel is the ideal setting. For special reasons — which vary from diocese to diocese — the local bishop can give permission for the marriage to be celebrated in another suitable place.

Second Reading

Paul encourages the Christians in Corinth to see themselves as a community defined by sincerity and truth rather than malice and wickedness. Does this describe your circle of friends?

Gospel Reading

The two women (Mary Magdalene and the other Mary) experience a range of emotions (from fear to being overjoyed) as they encounter first the angel and then the resurrected Jesus. How do you imagine you would react to encountering Jesus risen from the dead?

Angelus is powerful prayer for morning, noon, and evening

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Last month I celebrated Mass and attended the luncheon for the Springfield Diocesan Council of Catholic Women (SDCCW) at Immaculate Conception Church in Mattoon. The SDCCW is an affiliate of the National Council of Catholic Women and actively promotes the Catholic faith through service and leadership. The council is comprised of women from parishes all across our diocese.

Before lunch, I was asked to say the grace before our meal, which I happily did. Since it was about 12 noon, I led the group in reciting the *Angelus* prayer. Afterwards, a woman who grew up in Germany thanked me for leading the *Angelus* prayer, saying that she and her family in Germany would always stop to say that prayer at 12 noon and 6 p.m. every day, but that custom did not seem to be observed in the United States.

I told her that it is my personal practice to say the *Angelus* prayer the first thing when I get up in the morning, at 12 noon, and at 6 p.m. every day. If I am with people at noon or 6 p.m., I invite them to say the *Angelus* with me. Perhaps many others still pray the *Angelus* privately, but it is very powerful when people stop whatever they are doing to say this prayer together.

An oil painting completed between 1857 and 1859 by French painter Jean-François Millet, that he called *The Angelus*, depicts two farmers bowing in a field over a basket of potatoes while saying the *Angelus* prayer. The portrait includes a church that can be seen in the distance, indicating that it is the ringing of the bell from the church on the horizon that reminded the couple that it was time to say this prayer. Many churches today still ring their bells at 6 a.m., 12 noon and 6 p.m. as a reminder and a call to pause and say the *Angelus* prayer. In 1964, Pope Paul VI began to pray the *Angelus* publicly on a weekly basis at St. Peter's Square accompanied by a short address to the pilgrims there. Every pope since that time has continued to do so on Sundays at 12 noon.

So, what is the *Angelus* prayer and how does one pray it? The *Angelus* prayer is based on the biblical account of the Annunciation in the first chapter of the Gospel of St. Luke, verses

26-56. The Annunciation is the name given to that momentous event when the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary at her home in Nazareth and announced that she was to become the mother of the Incarnation of God. The title *Angelus* is Latin for "Angel" and comes from the first word of the prayer, which starts out, "The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary." The angel Gabriel's declaration starts out with the greeting, "Hail, Mary, full of grace" and then he tells her, "Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end" (Luke 1:31-33). Mary responds, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word" (Luke 1:38). At that very moment, Jesus is conceived in Mary's womb by the power of the Holy Spirit (Luke 1:35). Thus, the Solemnity of the Annunciation, which we celebrate in the Catholic Church throughout the world every year on March 25, also marks the Incarnation of God becoming man.

A Eucharistic Revival that Renews the Church: Part 1 By Cardinal Blase Cupich

The Catholic bishops of the United States have launched a eucharistic revival over the next three years. Pope Francis has made a singular contribution to that effort with the recent release of his powerful and theologically rich apostolic letter on the liturgical formation of the People of God, "Desiderio Desideravi" ("I have earnestly desired"). He tells us that his aim is to "invite the whole Church to rediscover, to safeguard, and to live the truth and power of the Christian celebration" as a means to more fully appreciating "the beauty of the Christian celebration and its necessary consequences for the life of the Church." This too must be the aim of our eucharistic revival. A central principle in that rediscovery is that in the ritual passed on to us from those disciples at the Last Supper, we encounter the crucified and risen Lord and are invited to participate in the Paschal Mystery by sharing in his work of saving the world. This engaging encounter by which the risen Lord invites us to share in his saving work is the core of our eucharistic faith, for, as the Holy Father observes: "The Christian faith is either an encounter with Him alive or it does not exist." To put it another way, the Mass is not a representation of the Last Supper, a play acting just to memorialize what Jesus did, much like we do on civic holidays that recall moments in our history. Rather, the Eucharist is a real encounter with the crucified and risen Christ, for, as the Council of Trent reminds us, what is really made present in the Eucharist as we participate in it is Christ's victory and triumph over death.

Authentic Participants

It was for this reason that when the Fathers of the Second Vatican Council took up the work of reforming the liturgy, a high priority was to promote the full, active and conscious participation of all the baptized. Every consideration was given to making sure that the liturgy would guarantee this encounter and assist all the baptized to understand that they come to the Eucharist as authentic participants, not spectators. From the start of Mass, in one voice we acknowledge our need for God's mercy in the Penitential Rite. We then join our voices in praising God as we sing the Gloria. Then, together we listen to the Word of God, and reply in one voice to the Word in the responsorial psalm and greet the risen Lord as the Gospel in the words of Easter morning in the Alleluia. We continue to deepen our participation in Christ's saving action as the Eucharistic Prayer recounts

what Jesus did in his life and at the Last Supper. In saying "amen," we proclaim that his story is now our story, which we make real by participating in the sharing of the one bread and the one cup, thus becoming one body in Christ. That is why Pope Francis writes in "Desiderio Desideravi": "The action of the celebration does not belong to the individual but to the Christ-Church, to the totality of the faithful united in Christ. The liturgy does not say 'I' but 'we,' and any limitation on the breadth of this 'we' is always demonic. The liturgy does not leave us alone to search out an individual supposed knowledge of the mystery of God. Rather, it takes us by the hand, together, as an assembly, to lead us deep within the mystery that the Word and the sacramental signs reveal to us."

The Real Mystery

The Holy Father notes that there are those who claim that we lost a sense of mystery about the Mass with the reforms of the Vatican II. To this he replies that we must be careful not to pursue a false sense of mystery, which he describes as "being overcome in the face of an obscure reality or a mysterious rite." Rather, he says, the real mystery is that Christ has invited us to participate in his saving work. This is what should astonish us, Pope Francis tells us. "It is ... marveling at the fact that the salvific plan of God has been revealed in the paschal deed of Jesus (cf. Eph 1: 3- 14), and the power of this paschal deed continues to reach us in the celebration of the 'mysteries' of the sacraments." More will be said about this in Part III of this series. In Part II of this series, we will delve more deeply into the circumstances that led to the Second Vatican Council, as a means of giving context to the restoration of the liturgy called for by the bishops at that time.

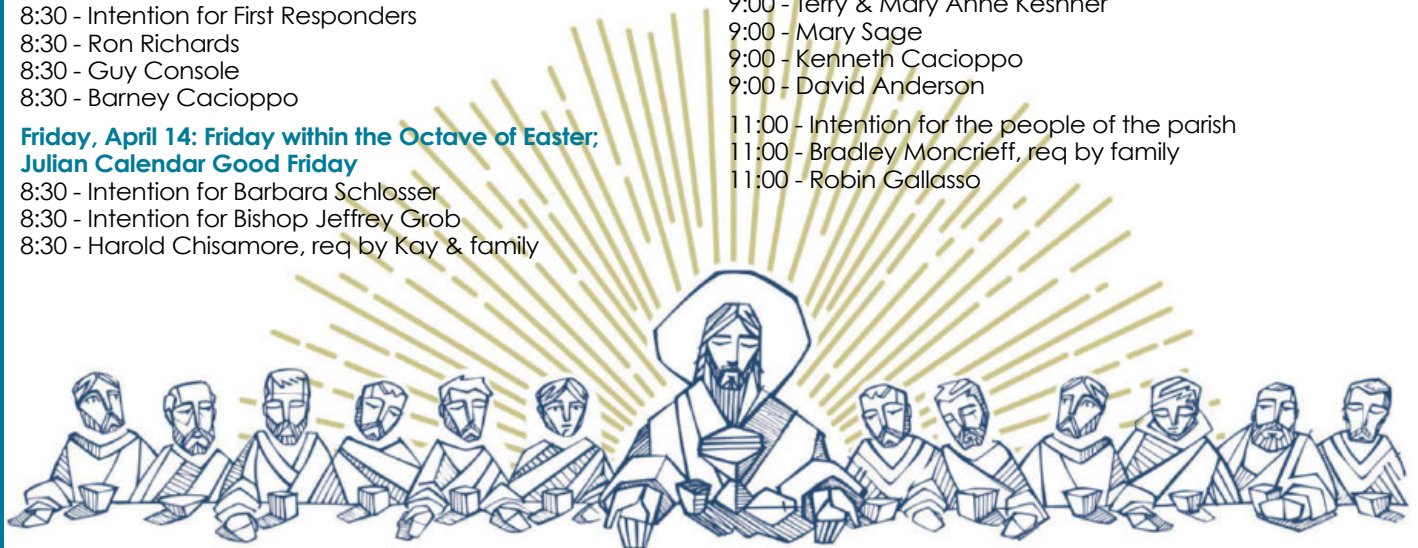
