GOT SPIRIT?

When we were in high school, there was an old cheer at ballgames, "We've got spirit, yes we do. We've got spirit, how 'bout you?" We would scream it back and forth with the opposing team's fans. And while, "Got Spirit?" could certainly be the catchphrase today, we see people receiving the spirit in many different ways. In Acts, there appear a loud noise and a driving wind, followed by people being able to understand speech in many languages. It is reminiscent of a booming, "This is my Son, my Beloved." Psalm 104 "Lord, Send out Your Spirit" was also the first psalm used at the Easter Vigil, in response to the creation story. First Corinthians acknowledges that there are many different spiritual gifts, but we must use them together as the body of Christ. The Sequence is a beautiful prayer that calls down the Spirit. In John's Gospel, the Spirit comes through the breath of Jesus. What can we take away from this? That the Spirit of God is not "one size fits all." Rather, the Holy Spirit will come to us, speak to us, be given to us, as each of us needs.

Pentecost

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

My friend has never heard of Christ and I want to share the Gospel with her but I'm afraid to. How do I share my faith?

Answer:

There are a lot of ways to bring up the topic of religion, without being judgmental or pushy. Begin by asking what her thoughts are about religion, or what her experience was growing up. Finding common ground is often easier than you think, because the questions and problems we have about God, the presence of evil, our purpose in life, and our relationship with God are universal concerns.

Why are you afraid? If you do not want to insult or offend someone, don't be pushy or judgmental. If you are uncertain about how to explain your own faith, do a little reading or practice with a friend. If you measure success only by this person converting, focus your attention more on beginning the conversation, not on bringing it to a perfect close! Faith is a journey of many acts of belief, many discussions about God, and many choices about how we practice what we preach. In some we will have great success; in others we will need forgiveness and perseverance. The most important thing to keep in mind is that the Holy Spirit is always at work and our most humble efforts can bear great fruit. Have faith in God because he has faith in you!

THEOLOGY 101

How to listen to a homily — whether good or not so good

No one will argue that all homilies are of the same quality. They certainly are not. Sometimes, when the priest or deacon speaks from conviction and with passion, we can easily be caught up in the word of God that he seeks to proclaim and explain. We begin to see connections between the word and our daily lives with all their challenges. Other times, probably more frequently, the homily is OK but not very inspired or inspiring. Finally, there are those homilies that can only be characterized as cringe-worthy — perhaps cluttered with a string of bad jokes or a collection of pious but pointless tidbits. Maybe the homily seems to bore even the preacher himself.

So, where does that put ordinary people in the congregation? Is it just a matter of the luck of the draw? Or is it a matter of listening attentively and gratefully when it is good and just resigning ourselves to those times when it is not so good?

A good starting point to answer these questions is to note the importance of the word of God that the homilies should break open and unfold for us. Our contact with the word of God contained in the Scriptures is vitally important to us. God's word gives us enlightenment as we face the challenging enigmas of life. That same word offers hope in the middle of the inevitable and deep struggles that come our way.

The homily ought to lead us into that all-important word to understand it and then lead us out of the word to live it in our lives. Sometimes, that does happen. Often, it does not. But there is an art to listening that can help us even when the homily or the homilist falters. There are things we can and ought to do as a matter of course.

Before we go to church, perhaps a day or more before we go, we should read the readings. Access to the online readings is easy. Go to this

website: www.bible.usccb.org. As you read, do so not as if you were reading a newspaper for information, but rather look on the readings as a way that God is personally communicating with you. Ask yourself, "What is the Lord trying to tell me?" Spend some time. Don't try to figure things out. Rather, listen attentively as you would to someone who loves you and wants to communicate with you, because that is exactly what God is doing through the biblical word. If you do this, when you arrive in church, you will be more than a passive consumer: You will be attentive to the word proclaimed and explained.

As the homilist preaches — whether superbly or not so well — something ought to emerge for you in the preaching. For that to happen, you need to be an active listener. You need to move from passive to active listening to hear something meaningful in the message. You need to be primed for this experience

by your own reflection and prayer beforehand.

After Mass and through the week, the process should continue. You leave the church with your experience of word and sacrament. Stay with the word. Medieval spiritual writers

spoke of *ruminatio*, which literally means "chewing" on the word. Let its power to inspire, to challenge, to console and to engender hope take hold of you across the week.

In the end, we can say that the proclamation of the word and preaching are essential elements of spiritual sustenance. Certainly, responsibility lies with those who

proclaim and preach. That is why we must pray for them. Responsibility, however, also rests with all of those who listen. We not only receive the word given to us, we must also take hold of it. ■

A Eucharistic Revival that Renews the Church: Part IV By Cardinal Blase Cupich

In the fall of 1965, when I was a junior in high school, my home parish of Saints Peter and Paul in South Omaha was making plans to build a new church.

Our pastor, Monsignor John Juricek, who had been with us since the 1920s, had planned on a building much like the original Gothic style church, with a long nave. The sanctuary, cordoned off by a Communion rail, would contain an altar against the front wall. Plenty of niches for statues and a choir loft on the back wall were also in the drawings.

But that year everything seemed to be changing in the Church, and for the decade that followed. One Sunday, Monsignor spoke at all the Masses to announce that the old design would not do. The bishops were meeting in Rome for the Second Vatican Council. It was clear things would be different. Monsignor felt an obligation not to build a church that would be outdated. Change was coming and we had to plan accordingly. The church would be in a fan shape. The altar would face the people. There would be no Communion rail separating the altar from the people.

Monsignor wanted people to know that the liturgical changes decided at the Council had been talked about for a long time, but never officially. He recalled reading books in the seminary about the way early Christians celebrated the liturgy. There was quiet discussion about the value of bringing some of those practices back, particularly if they were lost treasures to be recovered. As I discovered later in my studies of Christian worship, discussions about restoring the liturgy of the early Church dated back to the 16th century.

In fact, the bishops at the Second Vatican Council were deliberate in choosing the date of December 4, 1963, to issue their first document, the "Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy". It was exactly 400 years ago to the day that their predecessors in the 16th century met for the final time at the Council of Trent and asked Pope Pius IV and his successors to carry on the reform of the Mass. But that work was incomplete, as only one cardinal was tasked to do it and he had limited resources and knowledge of the liturgy.

Now four centuries later, the bishops at Vatican II could complete the aspiration of their ancestors not only to reform and renew but to restore the Roman liturgy to its earliest form by taking advantage of the scholarship done in the 19th and 20th centuries which rediscovered many of the writings of the Fathers of the early Church.

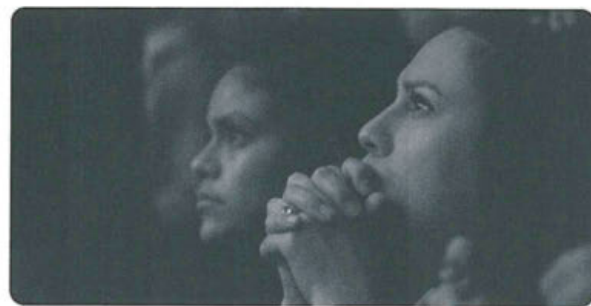
That is why they could describe their efforts as being in continuity with an unbroken tradition of the liturgy.

In less than two months, Pope St. Paul VI established a commission (Consilium) of 50 cardinals and bishops along with 200 experts from around the world. The pope gave them two tasks. They were to revise the liturgical books in accord with the norms established by the Council and provide resources to educate priests and the laity about the renewal.

With the work of the Consilium in a decade after the "Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy," Catholics witnessed a reform and restoration of the liturgy on a scale that has no precedent in the history of the Church, as you will see in the timeline below.

Admittedly, there were bumps in the road with such a massive undertaking. Clearly, there was unevenness in the preparation of priests and people. What was really missing was the link between renewal of the liturgy and the movement to authentically renew the Church. Without that deeper link to the renewal of the Church, the restoration of the liturgy easily became a matter of cosmetic changes. And for some that meant making the Mass "relevant" and largely unattached from the spiritual development of Catholics that the Council envisioned. This led to abuses and what Pope St. John Paul II called "outlandish innovations," in his letter ("Vicesimus Quintus Annus") marking the 25th anniversary of the "Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy."

Some of these abuses at times fostered disrespect for authentic liturgical renewal or caused confusion. Happily, this situation has been addressed through ongoing education and catechesis about the true spirit of the reforms.



In that same letter, the late pope also observed that while "the vast majority of the pastors and the Christian people have accepted the liturgical reform in a spirit of obedience and indeed joyful fervor," there was

Offering Hope and Healing for Those Who Mourn a Loss to Suicide

The Catholic Charities LOSS PROGRAM was started by Fr Charles Rubey in 1979 with 3 couples who had lost children to suicide. At that time, they would meet regularly in their homes.
