

23rd PLEDGE UPDATE & REPAIRS COMPLETED

Sunday, January 20, 2019 Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Parishioners,

As you have noticed, the new maintenance building has been completed, just north of the Blue Ribbon 2007 and 2018 parish school. On Friday, January 18th, the Village of Lake Zurich building inspectors and the Fidelity Group construction company with Jason Sfire, inspected the building and granted occupancy. Congratulations to the Fidelity Group and the parish. The remaining major project is the new flooring design in the Church. We had hoped by Christmas 2018 to have completed the new Church flooring, but our plans and finances are scheduled for 2019. A monument on the site of the first Church building will be erected in remembrance of the first church in the parish and in honor of the generations of Catholics since 1949 in this faith community as disciples of this Body of Christ. This monument is scheduled for the spring of 2019.

As pledges are made and paid, we will continue to address the one remaining project, which can be found on our parish website. See what this good parish has accomplished already in total pledges and number of donors! At this point in the Campaign, 861 donors helped us reach \$1,365,694 in total pledges. Total pledges paid are \$1,310,968. Balance due is \$54,726. It is not the intention of the Fix-It Campaign to place the parish in debt. As a parish, we spent 9 years paying off the \$3.8 million debt. We will only address the project as we raise the funds to pay. As Thomas Jefferson advised, "Never spend your money before you have it!" My Grandmother Ryan said the same message in her own way! For details on the campaign, including the presentation that was shown at Masses as well as the information on Charitable Giving Options, visit our parish website, www.stfrancislzparish.org. Thank you to those who have already responded with a pledge toward the \$1.7 million goal. St. Francis de Sales has a long history of generous giving. I respectfully ask for the prayers, involvement, and sacrifice of many, if not all, in the parish in making a pledge towards the Fix-It Campaign in addition to the generosity you provide each Sunday offering. For example, if 1,000 parishioners pledge the suggested amount of \$850 per year for 2 years, we will reach our campaign goal immediately to conclude the project. Please, everyone, participate through a prayer and a pledge. All the funds we raise in the Fix-It Campaign stay within the parish. I want to express my gratitude to Deacon John Sfire, Jason Sfire, and Amie Paige of The Fidelity Group for doing an extensive study of our parish campus, as was presented in the Fix-It Campaign presentation. I have asked the Fidelity Group, under the leadership of Deacon John Sfire and Jason Sfire, to serve as Project Managers of the Fix-It Campaign. I also want to offer my appreciation for the guidance and involvement of Tom Purtell, Chair of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC), Marty Bush, Member of the PPC; Mike Carlino, Chair of the Parish Finance Council; Doug Samz, Member of the Parish Finance Council; Christine DePrez, Cornerstone Bank Liaison; Laura Angelini, Business Manager; and Pam Lynch, Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries.

Avoiding another Roman flasco in February

y peremptorily ordering the American bishops 3. Don't ignore the devastating impact of a not to vote on local remedies for today's Catholic crisis of abusive cleray and malfeasant bishops, the Vatican dramatically raised the stakes for the February 2019 meeting that Pope Francis has called to discuss the crisis in a global perspective. How the Americans' taking decisive action last month would have impeded Roman deliberations in February—the strange explanation offered by the Vatican for its edict—will remain an open question. Now, the most urgent matter is to define correctly the issues that global gathering will address. As there are disturbing signs that Those Who Just Don't Get It are still not getting it, I'd like to flag some pitfalls the February meeting should avoid.

1. The crisis cannot be blamed primarily on "clericalism."

If "clericalism" means a wicked distortion of the powerful influence priests exercise by virtue of their office, then "clericalism" was and is a factor in the sexual abuse of young people, who are particularly vulnerable to that influence. If "clericalism" means that some bishops, faced with clerical sexual abuse, reacted as institutional crisis-managers rather than shepherds protecting their flocks, then "clericalism" has certainly been a factor in the abuse crisis in Chile, Ireland, Germany, the U.K., and Poland, and in the McCarrick case (and others) in the United States. There are more basic factors involved in the epidemiology of this crisis, however. And "clericalism" cannot be a one-size-fits-all diagnosis of the crisis, or a dodge to avoid confronting more basic causes like infidelity and sexual dysfunction. "Clericalism" may facilitate abuse and malfeasance; it doesn't cause them.

2. The language describing the crisis must reflect the empirical evidence.

"Protecting children" is absolutely essential; that is the ultimate no-brainer. But the mantra that this entire crisis—and the February meeting—is about "child protection" avoids the hard fact that in the United States and Germany (the two situations for which there is the largest body of data), the overwhelming majority of clerical sexual abuse has involved sexually dysfunctional priests preying on adolescent boys and young men. In terms of victimdemographics, this has never been a "pedophilia" crisis, although that language has been cemented into much of the world media's storyline since 2002. If the Rome meeting ignores data and traffics in Studies. media "narratives," it will fail.

culture of dissent.

Ireland and Quebec demonstrate that sexual abuse occurred in the pre-conciliar Church. Still, the data suggest that there was a large spike in abuse in the late 1960s, the 1970s, and much of the 1980s: decades when dissent from Catholicism's settled moral teaching was rampant among priests, tacit among too many bishops, and tolerated for the sake of keeping the peace. That appearement strategy was disastrous. February meeting-planners have said that the Church needs a change of culture. Does that include changing the culture of dissent that seems to have been involved in spiking the number of abusive clergy and malfeasant bishops? Then let the bishops gathered in Rome in February issue a clarion call to fidelity to the Church's teaching on the ethics of human love, as explained in the Catechism of the Catholic Church and St. John Paul II's Theology of the Body. And let them affirm that ethic as a pathway to happiness and human flourishing, rather than treating it a noble but impossible ideal.

4. Forget bogus "solutions."

How many times have we heard that changing the Church's discipline of celibacy would reduce the incidence of clerical sexual abuse? It's just not true. Marriage is not a crime-prevention program. And the data on the society-wide plague of sexual abuse suggests that most of these horrors take place within families. Celibacy is not the issue. The issues are effective seminary formation for living celibate love prior to ordination, and ongoing support for priests afterwards.

5. Resist playing the hierarchy card.

Drawing on lay expertise does not diminish episcopal authority; it enhances it. Bringing lay expertise to bear on this crisis is essential in getting at the facts and restoring the badly eroded credibility of too many bishops—and the Vatican. The leadership of the U.S. bishops' conference understood that, and the majority of American bishops were prepared to act on that understanding with serious remedies. The February meeting must be informed of those remedies—and it should consider how Roman autocracy made a very bad situation worse.

THEOLOGY 101

HOW TO LEARN ABOUT SPIRITUALITY AND THE LIFE OF FAITH

All of us learned the most important truths and skills for life from other people, above all, our parents and siblings and trusted mentors and teachers. And they didn't so much teach us as embody in their very lives the right ways of communicating, working, loving, and caring. We saw them in action, and that forever changed us.

The same is true for the way we journey to God as Jesus' disciples in the Holy Spirit, in other words, for our spirituality or life of faith. As helpful as catechetical and theological books are for giving us clear ideas about God and faith, we can only embrace what those books talk about by coming in contact with genuine people of faith. They offer us witness. They support us and enable us on our own journey of faith and spirituality.

Besides those living witnesses—for example, parents, grandparents, the Church's ministers, religious women and men—we also have an extraordinary resource in our tradition. We belong to the Communion of Saints. Outstanding men and women have gone before us and continue to lead, guide, and direct others who are still on their pilgrim way. You may want to consider how these holy ones can help you learn more about your own journey to God.

When I taught spirituality at Mundelein Seminary, I wanted my students to have some sense of the breadth and depth of the Christian experience as it has been lived out over two thousand years. To enable them to have that sense, I taught a course entitled *Spirituality by way of Autobiography*. Together, we read and reflected on five classic spiritual autobiographies of our Catholic Christian tradition. The autobiographies spanned two millennia, different historical and cultural settings, and the experiences of both men and women. These were very different people in very different settings, yet all of them shared a common journey of discipleship and spiritual growth.

We read the autobiographies in reverse historical order. It's easier to begin with a more familiar time and place. So, the first autobiography was *The Seven Storey Mountain* by Thomas Merton, a twentieth-century convert to Catholicism and a Trappist monk, who captures contemporary spiritual struggles and yearnings so well. That was followed by *The Story of a Soul* by Saint Thérèse of Lisieux, a nineteenth-century French Carmelite nun, who opened entirely

new spiritual horizons for ordinary people with her spirituality of the Little Way. Then, we studied Saint Teresa of Avila and *The Book of Her Life* that chronicled the extraordinary mystical and practical experiences of this sixteenth-century Carmelite nun and reformer. The next writer was the fourteenth-century English anchoress or



hermit, Julian of Norwich, a woman of great hope in the face of the Black Plague that destroyed so much of Europe. She wrote *The Revelations of Divine Love*. Finally, Saint Augustine's *Confessions* rounded out our study of spiritual autobiographies. This fourth and fifth century Father of the Church commands special

attention for his story of searching for God and his dramatic conversion. "Our hearts are restless, until they rest in you," he wrote with a wisdom that captures a basic direction in all the autobiographies and our own lives.

These autobiographies are classics of the Catholic spiritual tradition. Precisely as classics, they

demonstrate an enduring reliability. If you want to know better or more deeply what it is like to live the mystery of Jesus Christ, they can point the way. There are many inspirational books published every year. Some of them are quite good, others perhaps less so. Proven resources from our tradition ought to be a first choice for those who want to learn more and deepen their sense of what it means to live out our faith.

I remember students telling me that with the exception of Thomas Merton who was American and twentieth-century, the other writers seemed "different" and sometimes difficult to follow. Exactly so, I told them, and that was a good thing. These witnesses to faith draw us beyond ourselves and our often narrow experiences and help us to see the myriad ways that the Mystery of God draws all of us forward, each uniquely in our own circumstances, culture and historical moment. We can truly learn the ways of God from them.



One-in-five. That's the number of adults who are dealing with a mental illness this year. Yes, twenty percent! This number might surprise you since many people living with these illnesses and their families don't talk about the illness due the stigma surrounding mental illness.

If this has hit your family, you know that living with a family member who has a mental illness can take a real toll not just on the individual with the illness, but on those in the family as well. In many cases, family members of those who have been diagnosed with depression, bipolar disorder, an anxiety disorder, borderline personality disorder, or schizophrenia feel isolated from the community due to stigma, shame, and the fear of being judged.

The good news is that you are not alone and there is a program that can help you learn more about these illnesses, and how to help your ill family member and yourself. The National Alliance on Mental Illness will be offering a 12-week program designed specifically for those who have a family member with a mental illness.
