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

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

With this letter I write to you about a development that should disturb us greatly, both as citizens and as disciples of Jesus, the Lord of life.

Recently, two bills have been introduced in the Illinois House and Senate. The first, House Bill 2495 and Senate Bill 1942, both identical pieces of legislation, seeks to strip unborn persons of any protection – or even consideration – under the law and declare abortion to be a "fundamental right" and matter of health care. The end result is that an abortion could be obtained at any stage of pregnancy, including late term, for any reason and without any regulation. The law would no longer guarantee any modicum of humanity or compassion for any unborn person in Illinois, even if they are partially born. This legislation also repeals the Abortion Performance Refusal Act, which protects doctors, nurses and hospitals who refuse to permit, recommend, perform or assist in abortion. In so doing, rights of conscience, especially religious objections, will be lost.

The second piece of legislation House Bill 2467 and its identical Senate Bill 1594, repeals the Illinois Parental Notice of Abortion Act. This law, upheld unanimously by the Illinois Supreme Court just six years ago, has the common-sense purpose of ensuring that parents would be part of the life-altering decision of their minor child in the case she seeks an abortion. This effective law has reduced abortions performed on minors by fifty-seven percent.

As citizens of a state and people of faith who care about the common good, I urge you to join me and my brother bishops in an effort to defeat this radical departure from current law and practice in our state. Statement re: List of Accused Priests Released Today by Anderson & Associates

This message is for all priests, deacons, parishes, and pastoral center employees and its agencies.

Today Anderson & Associates released the names of clerics and laypeople they say have been accused of the sexual abuse of minors and have served in one or more of the six Illinois dioceses. The Archdiocese of Chicago reports all allegations we receive to the civil authorities. In addition to the priests listed on the Archdiocese's website, we have identified 22 priests of the Archdiocese of Chicago on Anderson & Associates' list.

The Archdiocese has reported 20 of these clerics to the civil authorities; in one of the remaining two cases, the Archdiocese first received notice when the cleric was arrested, and in the other it was an allegation of misconduct with an adult, not a minor. <u>Our online statement</u> links to details the circumstances surrounding these 22 allegations and disposition of those cases.

Priests with substantiated allegations are listed on the Archdiocese's website.

The Archdiocese of Chicago does not "police itself." It reports all allegations to the civil authorities, regardless of the date of the alleged abuse, whether the priest is a diocesan priest or religious order priest, and whether the priest is alive or dead.

When an allegation against an archdiocesan cleric is made and before any investigation begins, the archdiocesan Office of Assistance Ministry promptly reaches out to the person making the allegation and offers therapy at archdiocesan expense from a licensed therapist of the person's choosing. The Archdiocese withdraws the accused priest from ministry pending investigation of the allegation and publicly announces this action.

After the civil authorities have completed their investigation, the Archdiocese conducts its investigation.

The Independent Review Board, which considers the results of such investigations, was established in 1993. The majority of its members are laypeople. The Independent Review Board is the primary adviser to the archbishop on issues of risk to children and fitness for ministry.

Anderson & Associates conflates people who have been accused, but may be innocent, with those who have substantiated allegations against them, referring to all as perpetrators. Their list includes:

- a priest whose allegations were investigated by the public authorities and were determined to be unfounded. The
 Archdiocese's Independent Review Board also investigated and determined that the allegations were not substantiated. The
 priest was then returned to ministry.
- two priests whose cases are under investigation; their cases were reported to the authorities and they have been withdrawn
 from ministry, pending the outcome of the investigation.
- a seminarian (who was a transitional deacon) who was never ordained a priest.
- a priest who was accused of misconduct with an adult, not a minor.

Many of the names listed by Anderson & Associates are religious order priests. We provide the following information to help clarify their governance:

Dioceses and religious orders are separately governed entities in the Roman Catholic Church. Bishops govern dioceses; religious superiors govern religious orders. The bishop selects, trains, and supervises diocesan priests. The religious orders select, train and supervise their priests. The diocesan and religious order priests often do similar work, but each group is responsible to its own chain of authority (Canon 586). Disagreements between a bishop and a religious superior are referred to the Holy See for resolution.

A bishop and a religious superior work cooperatively such as when a bishop grants faculties (a license) for a religious priest to work in a diocesan institution, such as a parish (Canon 678). Nevertheless, the religious order priest is still under the authority of his religious superior. Similarly, a bishop may revoke a religious order priest's faculties (a license) to work in the diocese. In that eventuality, the supervision and management of the order priests also remains the responsibility of his religious superior. In brief, a diocesan priest is the responsibility of the diocese and a religious priest is the responsibility of the religious order.

If the Archdiocese of Chicago receives an allegation that a religious priest has engaged in sexual misconduct with a minor, the archdiocese reports it to the civil authorities, publicly withdraws the priest's faculties to work in the archdiocese, and refers the matter to his religious superior.

Religious superiors have the same obligation and responsibility as bishops to adhere to the terms set forth in the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People.

ave you ever had a day when you didn't know if you were coming or going? Of course you have, we all have. All those days when there is so much going on in our lives that we don't know if we are coming or going. For many of us, there hardly seems to be enough hours in a day or days in a week as it is. Really, let's think about our regular schedules which might include Christmas, Easter, the end of the school year, planning a business trip or a vacation. And then there are the unpredictable things like death or illness in the family, weather related disasters, traffic and other accidents...and knowing whether we are coming or going is truly an issue which we struggle with more than we care to think. It's almost like living in the state of pandemonium in our minds.

In giving this thought some attention during this Season of Lent, the most glaring example of one not knowing if they were coming or going was the disciples of Christ. Think about the days leading up to and following the Crucifixion of Jesus. All that Jesus did before and after that day, left those closest to Him not knowing if they were coming or going. It is quite simple for us to "read" about those happenings but think what it was like to experience all that happened in person. For the apostles to spend the days before, during and after the Crucifixion. After being involved in the greatness of Jesus performing miracles such as cleansing of the leper, healing the hemorrhaging woman, healing the paralytic and giving sight to the blind man, and then to be betrayed by one of His own only to suffer and die on the Cross and then ascend into Heaven before their eyes and fearing for their own lives, especially since their Leader was no longer with them in His physical body.

Knowing all, Jesus knew that He had to bring His disciples back to reality because He knew that they would never fully understand all that had and would happen. So Jesus spoke words they might understand and believe when he said;

"whoever believes in Me will not perish, but have eternal life. And in the gospel of John, chapter 14, for those of us who believe, as well as His disciples that day, Jesus said; "if anyone loves me, he will keep my word. Proverbs 19:17 Project Recap

Michelle Rosener, daughter of Matt and Katy Roesner, is a senior at Stevenson High School and is goingo to attend Texas Christian University upon graduation. She has worked a the front desk in the Ministry Center over the past three years and has been involved with our Youth Ministry program over the past four years.

Hello! My name is Michelle Roesner and I am going to briefly speak about the homeless person project that I created a year and a half ago and executed this winter. Many of you may know about the project, however, for those who do not, my project is called the Proverbs 19:17 Project.

A few summers ago at a Steubenville Youth Conference, an event held for Christian teens across the nation, I felt an urge to step up and do more for those living on the streets. I had been thinking about ways that I could serve my community and felt a huge tug on my heart at the end of the retreat to develop a plan to help the homeless on a greater scale. The planning started as soon as I got home. I worked on my project for many hours, researching and exploring ways to help those in my community. Through my research I discovered that according to the Chicago Coalition for the Homeless, there are 64,000 homeless adults and 48,000 homeless children in Chicago alone. These staggering statistics motivated me to commit to this project and have fueled my drive. This past December, I along with many amazing volunteers, provided as many homeless people as I could with basic supplies to help them as we moved into colder months.

I created 80 Care Kits each containing:

- 1 blanket
- 4 water bottles
- 2 pairs of socks
- 1 bar of soap
- 4 tubes of toothpaste
- 2 toothbrushes
- 1 bar of deodorant
- 1 winter hat
- 1 pair of gloves

- 1 can of tuna
- 1 cup of applesauce
- 1 fruit cup
- 1 bag of trail mix
- 1 tub of peanut butter
- 12 granola bars
- 2 protein bars
- 4 bags of fruit snacks
- And 1 pop tart pack

None of this would have been possible without the generous support of this parish community. Through the generosity of many people in our parish in total we received one thousand nine hundred and sixty eight dollars and sixteen cents, one thousand seven hundred seventy six dollars and thirty three cents of this total amount was donated to Lincoln Park Community Services, a homeless shelter in Chicago.

The money that was not given to the homeless shelter was put toward buying some supplies such as large zip lock bags and a few extra hygiene products for the kits. 100% of all

monetary donations went directly to the homeless.

As for physical donations, we received 3760 items before the cutoff date. Any items that were not used directly for the kits were given to Journeys The Road Home, a homeless shelter in Palatine.

All in all, we put together 80 Care Kits over the course of three long yet rewarding days dedicated solely to sorting and packing. These Care Kits were then distributed on December 22nd with the help of many amazing volunteers. Seriously, the volunteers did a fantastic job! I am so thankful for them.

We distributed the Kits by loading up about half a dozen vehicles and driving around until we saw a homeless person. When we did, we hopped out and handed it to them with a smile and a simple Merry Christmas. The reactions we got were priceless and extremely humbling. I would love to share one with you quickly.

The second person I gave a kit to saw me walking over with the kit and his eyes completely lit up. He asked me if what I was carrying was for him and I said yes. He at first didn't realize it was anything more than a blanket, however, once I handed him the kit and he felt its weight, his eyes became glossy with tears and he was speechless. He looked completely overjoyed. I said Merry Christmas and he thanked me a million times over. I will never forget this.

This project changed my life. Behind the scenes, it was really hard work yet God willing everything got done. All of you and I made Christmas a little more cheerful for many homeless people.

I am a senior in high school and will be moving to Texas next fall so sadly I will personally be unable to carry out this project again in the future. Since this project was so successful, however, I would love to pass it on. If you know of anyone who would like to be in charge of this project in the following years, please talk to me in the gathering space

Finally, I would like to say that this project was not my work. Sure it was my physical work; however, I was simply the hands and feet of Jesus carrying out His deeds. Many have and many will praise this project, yet, the best way to show any gratitude for this project would be to simply stay a few minutes after and pray to God thanking Him for his goodness. Again, this was simply me acting as a vessel. I ask that you thank Him for giving me drive and courage to carry out His work. That will be thanks enough in my eyes. Thank you all again and God bless!











26th PLEDGE UPDATE & REPAIRS COMPLETED

Dear Parishioners, Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The remaining major projects are the new flooring design in the Church. We had hoped by Christmas 2018 to have completed the new Church flooring, but our plans and finances are scheduled for 2019. A monument on the site of the first Church building will be erected in remembrance of the first church in the parish and in honor of the generations of Catholics since 1949 in this faith community as disciples of this Body of Christ. This monument is scheduled for the spring of 2019.

As pledges are made and paid, we will continue to address the one remaining project, which can be found on our parish website. See what this good parish has accomplished already in total pledges and number of donors! At this point in the Campaign, 861 donors helped us reach \$1,384,493 in total pledges. Total pledges paid are \$1,357,492. Balance due is \$27,006. It is not the intention of the Fix-It Campaign to place the parish in debt. As a parish, we spent 9 years paying off the \$3.8 million debt. We will only address the project as we raise the funds to pay. As Thomas Jefferson advised, "Never spend your money before you have it!" My Grandmother Ryan said the same message in her own way! Thank you to those who have already responded with a pledge toward the \$1.7 million goal. St. Francis de Sales has a long history of generous giving. I respectfully ask for the prayers, involvement, and sacrifice of many, if not all, in the parish in making a pledge towards the Fix-It Campaign in addition to the generosity you provide each Sunday offering. For example, if 1,000 parishioners pledge the suggested amount of \$850 per year for 2 years, we will reach our campaign goal immediately to conclude the project. Please, everyone, participate through a prayer and a pledge. All the funds we raise in the Fix-It Campaign stay within the parish. I want to express my gratitude to Deacon John Sfire, Jason Sfire, and Amie Paige of The Fidelity Group for doing an extensive study of our parish campus, as was presented in the Fix-It Campaign presentation. I have asked the Fidelity Group, under the leadership of Deacon John Sfire and Jason Sfire, to serve as Project Managers of the Fix-It Campaign. I also want to offer my appreciation for the guidance and involvement of Tom Purtell, Chair of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC), Marty Bush, Member of the PPC; Mike Carlino, Chair of the Parish Finance Council; Doug Samz, Member of the Parish Finance Council; Christine DePrez, Cornerstone Bank Liaison; Laura Angelini, Business Manager; and Pam Lynch, Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries.

Wall Street Journal March 29th 2019 Hollywood Admits Abortion is Violent By Joseph F Naumann

When I was young, it was common in Catholic households to find the church's weekly Legion of Decency movie reviews cut out and taped to the refrigerator. Hollywood producers dreaded a C rating - "condemned" - because Catholics would stay away from such films in droves.

While the US Conference of Catholic Bishops still offers guidance for moviegoers, many people look first to the ratings of the Motion Picture Association of America. I recently saw a film that received an R rating from the MPAA but I nevertheless recommend to all people of goodwill.

"Unplanned" is the true story of Abby Johnson, a former Planned Parenthood Clinic director. On a morning when her clinic was short-staffed, a doctor I asked Ms. Johnson to assist during a surgical abortion on a 13-week-old unborn child by holding ultrasound probe as he positioned the suction catheter. Ms. Johnson was so distraught by what she witnessed that she resigned.

"Unplanned' got its R rating for "violence." It is noteworthy for Hollywood to acknowledge that abortion is violent, but the on-screen violence in "Unplanned" isn't gratuitous; it's medically accurate.

Viewers see exactly what compelled Ms. Johnson to leave an organization to which she had devoted herself for more than 8 years.

"Unplanned" wasn't produced to shame women who have had abortions or to condemn those who perform them. It's about redemption. Ms. Johnson herself had two abortions and is a beautiful example of how God's endless mercy is available to all who ask for it. Dr. Anthony Levatino, who performed countless abortions and served as a consultant to the filmmakers, has committed to educating others about the medical reality that each abortion takes the distinct and unique human life.

Many Americans have been shocked by the extreme abortion legislation recently enacted in New York, where abortion is legal up to the moment of birth and a teenage girl can have an abortion without her parents' knowledge or consent. What an irony that the MPAA rating of "Unplanned" doesn't allow a 16-year-old to see this movie without a parent or guardian present.

Such laws challenge those who revere the sanctity of human life to bring new zeal and energy to our efforts to renew the culture. Social change most often occurs when we are forced to see the truth of human-rights violations. When 14-year-old Emmett Till was brutally murdered in 1955 for allegedly whistling at a white woman in a Mississippi grocery store, his mother demanded an open casket funeral despite the shocking condition of his body. "Let the world see what has happened," she insisted. Till's murder, and the courage it took for a mother to expose the brutality of her son's death, helped to change the course of the civil-rights struggle.

Perhaps Ms. Johnson's courage in coming forward will change our our nation from one that embraces violent, R-rated solutions for unplanned pregnancies to one that sees each human life as a gift to be celebrated.

Listening sessions

OPCY has participated in many of the listening sessions in response to the sexual abuse scandal being held around the archdiocese. Some of the sessions are parish based and a few have been vicariate



based with the Cardinal present.

The concerns expressed by the people in attendance have been

consistent. There is a lack of trust in church leadership that they will do the right thing; lack of trust for Bishops to be able to hold themselves accountable. There is a desire for more lay leadership, greater transparency, greater inclusion of women in ministry and leadership roles.

OPCY cannot address all the concerns but we can help with letting the people of the Archdiocese of Chicago know what is being done now to create safe environments and what has been done in the past.

Today, all clergy, employees and volunteers who work with children are required to follow all compliance of the archdiocese in order to work or volunteer at a parish or school. Parishes and schools are required to verify that annually. There are no "loop holes," no

one "knows a guy" that can get them out of compliance. That chart can be found here.

Ninety percent of the employees in OPCY are women who work hard to protect children. OPCY has access to the Cardinal on all areas of child protection. He asks for and receives the input of women in a variety of subject matters.

A new section has been added to our website under News & Events click here. This includes coverage from past years. Here you will find that the archdiocese has



reported every allegation it has received to civil authorities, it has released over 60,000 pages of documents in 2014, it has listed all men with a substantiated allegation of sexual abuse of a minor on the website. You will find since 1992, the Archdiocese of Chicago has done its best to protect the children in its care.

Audit Update

Parish audits were sent on March 13 to pastors and site administrators. The information included a letter from Cardinal Cupich reminding all the need for 100% compliance. Included is a letter from Mary Jane Doerr, director of the Office for the Protection of Children and Youth, and instructions on how to complete the audit. We are using a web-based survey to collect information. That gives OPCY the ability to see instantly the status of compliance at any parish. Remember, it is not enough to submit the audit on time, (though that is important), all clergy, employees and volunteers who work with children are to be in complete compliance. If they are long time employees or volunteers, compliance ought to have been verified years ago. If they are new, compliance ought to be complete in 60 days. By March there is no reason not to expect 100% compliance in all areas.

This year's survey includes a box for site administrators to explain why compliance is not 100% and a timeline to let us know when it will be completed.

OPCY is very much aware of how much time it takes to verify compliance in a parish and a school. We also know if a child fell down in front of us, we'd run to help them. This work is just as important and if our work saves one child from being harmed it is worth it.

OPCY monthly webinars are well received. Thank you to all who watch them either live or recorded. A big thank you to Brian Brach of Radio and TV who is the genius behind the scenes, making the webinars possible. OPCY is working on recording a basic Introduction to Compliance webinar that will serve both as new information and reminders for site administrators. A link will be sent when it is completed.



Why is there Divine Mercy Sunday?

Jesus appeared to St. Faustina Kowalska for the first time on Feb. 22, 1931 and gave her His first revelation about His Divine Mercy. Jesus' message is that He desires mankind to avail itself to the infinite mercy of God on earth. That is why he wanted the first Sunday after Easter to be Divine Mercy Sunday. This is not a feast day invented in the Middle Ages or thought up by the Vatican. This is a special feast because it is one asked for by Jesus Himself!

How do we avail ourselves to this Divine Mercy?

Jesus will give us complete forgiveness of sins and punishments if we do a few simple tasks. We are asked to attend Mass and receive Holy Communion on Divine Mercy Sunday. We also should say the Divine Mercy Chaplet and venerate the Divine Mercy Image on Divine Mercy Sunday. A good confession must be made 20 days before or after Divine Mercy Sunday. Not much to ask for when you consider that you receive forgiveness of sins and remission of punishment!

Why did God give us the Feast of Divine Mercy?

Jesus said to St. Faustina, "I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender Mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My Mercy. The soul that goes to Confession and receives Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the Divine blood gates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near Me, even though its sins be scarlet. My Mercy is so great that no mind, be it man or angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it is solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the fount of My Mercy." (St. Faustina Diary 699)

Easter and Divine Mercy Sunday Easter is the day that we celebrate the triumphant Jesus Christ who sacrificed His life for us and then rose from the dead. On Divine Mercy Sunday, we again are given a view of Jesus as the loving Savior. The Divine Mercy Image Painting hangs in our church on the south wall. Jesus told St. Faustina to have this image painted. It shows the red and white rays of His blood and water. He also told her to have the words, "Jesus I trust in you" written across the bottom. 
