FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Dear Parishioners, Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The remaining major projects are the new flooring design in the Church. We had hoped by Christmas 2018 to have completed the new Church flooring, but our plans and finances are scheduled for 2019. A monument on the site of the first Church building will be erected in remembrance of the first church in the parish and in honor of the generations of Catholics since 1949 in this faith community as disciples of this Body of Christ. This monument is scheduled for the spring of 2019.

As pledges are made and paid, we will continue to address the one remaining project, which can be found on our parish website. See what this good parish has accomplished already in total pledges and number of donors! At this point in the Campaign, 867 donors helped us reach \$1,389,935 in total pledges. Total pledges paid are \$1,367,557. Balance due is \$22,367. It is not the intention of the Fix-It Campaign to place the parish in debt. As a parish, we spent 9 years paying off the \$3.8 million debt. We will only address the project as we raise the funds to pay. As Thomas Jefferson advised, "Never spend your money before you have it!" My Grandmother Ryan said the same message in her own way! For details on the campaign, including the presentation that was shown at Masses as well as the information on Charitable Giving Options, visit our parish website, www.stfrancislzparish.org. **Thank you to those who have already responded with a pledge toward the \$1.7 million goal.** St. Francis de Sales has a long history of generous giving. I respectfully ask for the prayers, involvement, and sacrifice of many, if not all, in the parish in making a pledge towards the Fix-It Campaign in addition to the generosity you provide each Sunday offering. For example, **if 1,000 parishioners pledge the suggested amount of \$850 per year for 2 years, we will reach our campaign goal immediately to conclude the project.** Please, everyone, participate through a prayer and a pledge. All the funds we raise in the Fix-It Campaign stay within the parish. I want to express my gratitude to Deacon John Sfire, Jason Sfire, and Amie Paige of The Fidelity Group for doing an extensive study of our parish campus, as was presented in the Fix-It Campaign presentation. I have asked the Fidelity Group, under the leadership of Deacon John Sfire and Jason Sfire, to serve as Project Managers of the Fix-It Campaign. I also want to offer my appreciation for the guidance and involvement of Tom Purtell, Chair of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC), Marty Bush, Member of the PPC; Mike Carlino, Chair of the Parish Finance Council; Doug Samz, Member of the Parish Finance Council; Christine DePrez, Cornerstone Bank Liaison; Laura Angelini, Business Manager; and Pam Lynch, Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries.

Disciple: Those who accept Jesus' message to follow Him.

Intentional Disciples: Following Jesus (purposeful and deliberate)

Sherry Weddell's Forming Intentional Disciples

Statistics from the PEW Research Center (www.siena.org, pg. 4): For every 100 people who identify as Catholic:

- 51 never show up
- 45 go to Mass once a month
- 4 are the core, committed people who make church activities happen

Other Statistics:

- Only 30% of people who were raised Catholic are still practicing (p. 24).
- The fastest growing demographic is currently the unaffiliated/"NONE" (p. 19).
- Of the people who left to go to another church—the majority said their spiritual needs were not being met and they found a religion they liked more (p. 28).
- Of the people who left to become a NONE—the majority said they "just drifted away" and "stopped believing in the religion's teachings" (p. 32).

The key—and it's all about a Relationship with Jesus

The thresholds of Conversion:

- **Trust**—A person is able to trust or has a positive association with Jesus, the Church, or a Christian believer.
- **Curiosity**—A person is intrigued by or desires to know more about Jesus, His life, His teachings, or some aspect of the Christian faith.
- **Openness**—A person acknowledges to himself or herself

and to God that they are open to the possibility of a personal and spiritual change.

- **Seeking**—The person moves from being passive to an active seeking to know God.
- **Intentional Discipleship** (following Jesus)—This is the decision to "drop your nets" to commit to follow Jesus as an obedient disciple.

As the Catechism and Matthew 28:19-20 states: "The Church by her very nature is missionary, sent by Christ to all the nations to make disciples of them." (CCC 767, Mt 28:19-20) Our goal/the Church's goal is to follow Jesus' call and help others follow Jesus' call.

Keith also facilitated the Archdiocese Intentional Discipleship day with Sherry. He is the former Director of the Office for the New Evangelization and a deacon for the Archdiocese of Chicago.

He has identified 3 steps in this process:

- **Making**—make disciples—help people encounter Jesus and say yes.
- **Maturing**—grow and deepen their relationship—once you get it, you long to know Jesus more.
 - Sacraments are seen in a new way.
 - Living a moral life is not imposed, is a choice, a response.
- **Missioning**—go out and share with others.

When you are a disciple, when you choose to follow Jesus—You long to know Jesus more...

Notes on Intentional Discipleship/Parish Mission from the Parish Pastoral Council Meeting Minutes (October 28, 2019)

Judy Reilly gave the group an update on Intentional Discipleship and the Parish Mission. She distributed a handout so everyone could follow along. The topics she discussed included the following:

Why make disciples?

How do we make Jesus Christ relevant in people's lives, and how do we offer others this gift of friendship with Jesus?

The timeline of the Parish's mission of Intentional Discipleship from 2007, when there were Bible study classes, through August 2017, when Deacon Keith Strohm was brought on board, to today's date when there are now the Build and Equip groups.

Formation Fruit: Judy discussed what groups have

developed as "fruit" of this mission which include the Called and Gifted workshop, the Growing Disciples corner in the church bulletin and newsletter, a mom's group, continued monthly meetings of first generation of Equip, Judy speaking at the school to staff regarding discipleship, the ABLAZE parish mission, and now the second generation groups of BUILD (building a friendship with Jesus) and EQUIP (equipping with tools needed to share Jesus with others). There are currently 32 facilitators with 135 new participants comprised of 31 in EQUIP and 102 in BUILD.

What's next?

- A 3rd generation of Build/Equip
- Alpha – A formation process exploring the big issues and the basics of the Christian faith, including the Gospel message. This would take place over 11 weeks.
- 2019 Mission
- The continuation of Bible study

Proverbs 19:17 Project Recap

Michelle Rosener, daughter of Matt and Katy Roesner, is a senior at Stevenson High School and is going to attend Texas Christian University upon graduation. She has worked at the front desk in the Ministry Center over the past three years and has been involved with our Youth Ministry program over the past four years.

Hello! My name is Michelle Roesner and I am going to briefly speak about the homeless person project that I created a year and a half ago and executed this winter. Many of you may know about the project, however, for those who do not, my project is called the Proverbs 19:17 Project.

A few summers ago at a Steubenville Youth Conference, an event held for Christian teens across the nation, I felt an urge to step up and do more for those living on the streets. I had been thinking about ways that I could serve my community and felt a huge tug on my heart at the end of the retreat to develop a plan to help the homeless on a greater scale. The planning started as soon as I got home. I worked on my project for many hours, researching and exploring ways to help those in my community. Through my research I discovered that according to the Chicago Coalition for the Homeless, there are 64,000 homeless adults and 48,000 homeless children in Chicago alone. These staggering statistics motivated me to commit to this project and have fueled my drive. This past December, I along with many amazing volunteers, provided as many homeless people as I could with basic supplies to help them as we moved into colder months.

I created 80 Care Kits each containing:

- 1 blanket
- 4 water bottles
- 2 pairs of socks
- 1 bar of soap
- 4 tubes of toothpaste
- 2 toothbrushes
- 1 bar of deodorant
- 1 winter hat
- 1 pair of gloves
- 1 can of tuna
- 1 cup of applesauce
- 1 fruit cup
- 1 bag of trail mix
- 1 tub of peanut butter
- 12 granola bars
- 2 protein bars
- 4 bags of fruit snacks
- And 1 pop tart pack

None of this would have been possible without the generous support of this parish community. Through the generosity of many people in our parish in total we received one thousand nine hundred and sixty eight dollars and sixteen cents, one thousand seven hundred seventy six dollars and thirty three cents of this total amount was donated to Lincoln Park Community Services, a homeless shelter in Chicago.

The money that was not given to the homeless shelter was put toward buying some supplies such as large zip lock bags and a few extra hygiene products for the kits. 100% of all

monetary donations went directly to the homeless.

As for physical donations, we received 3760 items before the cutoff date. Any items that were not used directly for the kits were given to Journeys The Road Home, a homeless shelter in Palatine.

All in all, we put together 80 Care Kits over the course of three long yet rewarding days dedicated solely to sorting and packing. These Care Kits were then distributed on December 22nd with the help of many amazing volunteers. Seriously, the volunteers did a fantastic job! I am so thankful for them.

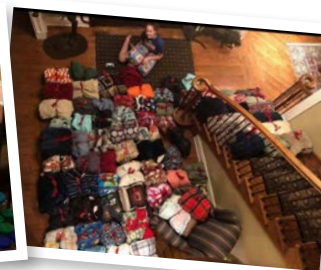
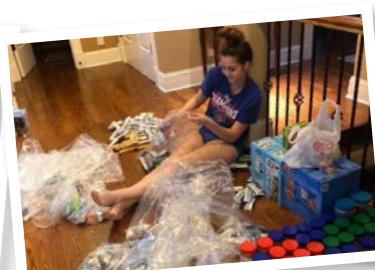
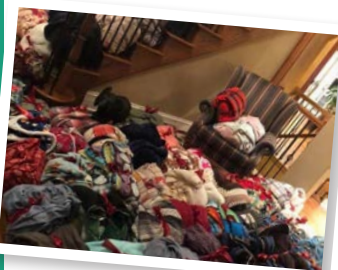
We distributed the Kits by loading up about half a dozen vehicles and driving around until we saw a homeless person. When we did, we hopped out and handed it to them with a smile and a simple Merry Christmas. The reactions we got were priceless and extremely humbling. I would love to share one with you quickly.

The second person I gave a kit to saw me walking over with the kit and his eyes completely lit up. He asked me if what I was carrying was for him and I said yes. He at first didn't realize it was anything more than a blanket, however, once I handed him the kit and he felt its weight, his eyes became glossy with tears and he was speechless. He looked completely overjoyed. I said Merry Christmas and he thanked me a million times over. I will never forget this.

This project changed my life. Behind the scenes, it was really hard work yet God willing everything got done. All of you and I made Christmas a little more cheerful for many homeless people.

I am a senior in high school and will be moving to Texas next fall so sadly I will personally be unable to carry out this project again in the future. Since this project was so successful, however, I would love to pass it on. If you know of anyone who would like to be in charge of this project in the following years, please talk to me in the gathering space.

Finally, I would like to say that this project was not my work. Sure it was my physical work; however, I was simply the hands and feet of Jesus carrying out His deeds. Many have and many will praise this project, yet, the best way to show any gratitude for this project would be to simply stay a few minutes after and pray to God thanking Him for his goodness. Again, this was simply me acting as a vessel. I ask that you thank Him for giving me drive and courage to carry out His work. That will be thanks enough in my eyes. Thank you all again and God bless!

Deacon's Corner

And I am writing this about one week before it is to be sent out. It is Divine Mercy Sunday and I have already written this week's (April 30) DC but I felt moved to write this one as soon as I left Mass this morning. I guess it is a carry-over from Easter Sunday when I served 3 Masses on Easter Morning with Fr. Ryan. The Church was packed almost out the doors and Fr. Ryan and I spoke about how it may have been the most crowded ever. And while we certainly welcomed all who attended Mass warmly, this morning when I was at Mass and looked around, there were many empty seats and that brought a sadness over me.

Looking back over time, the same thing seems to happen every year both at Easter and Christmas. And I can say for certain that it never seemed to affect me the way it did today. I began to give it a lot of thought as to why I felt so sad this year and have never felt this way in the past. Maybe as I get older, I tend to look more deeply into the emotional aspects of my life. How about you? Have you ever given that much thought as we progress in age?

In a way, I feel sorry for the hundreds, even thousands, of people who only experience the Table of the Lord once or twice a year. Not to be judgmental, but I have a hard time understanding what they feel they are accomplishing by doing so on such a minimal basis. Especially since Jesus Christ, our Risen Lord, makes himself available to us literally seven days a week, fifty-two weeks a year.

I was thinking about Christians who lived 2,000 years ago and how they had to keep their faith a secret. They had to worship in hiding for fear of persecution or even death. And over time, Jesus has made himself available to us every day of our lives. When He appeared in the Upper Room and called upon the Holy Spirit, the third person of the Blessed Trinity, to come and dwell within His Disciples. And we all know that was really the indication that the Holy Spirit will dwell within each and every

one of us at all times, for we are all His Disciples. And being a Disciple of Jesus Christ, it is our honor to speak His name, to live as He lived, to obey His Word and to love our neighbor, all with the hope of Eternal Salvation, to be one with Our Lord in Paradise.


So my question is; "how do we do that by only attending Mass once or twice a year?" My answer is; "I don't believe we can". In saying that, I am not being judgmental of anyone else, but this is what I truly believe is my path to Eternal Salvation. And I know that any path we follow will not be easy for us to attain. Why? Priests sees progress on abuse, but also resistance in some 'quarters'

NEW YORK (CNS) — The clergy abuse crisis will not be over in our lifetime, particularly in countries where it is just being acknowledged, according to Jesuit Father Hans Zollner.

However, a growing understanding of the issue among church leadership and commitment to concrete measures that include lay participation will help dispel anger and eventually restore trust, he said.

Father Zollner is a member of the Pontifical Commission for the Protection of Minors and president of the Center for Child Protection at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome. He was a lead organizer of the Vatican's February summit on abuse.

Father Zollner delivered the Russo Family Lecture March 26 at Jesuit-run Fordham University. It was preceded by a presentation by Margaret Leland Smith and Karen Terry, researchers at John Jay College of Criminal Justice and authors of two seminal reports on the scope and causes of abuse by clergy.

"We are at a breaking point in church history," Father Zollner said. The abuse crisis is a symptom of a disease that relates to deeper issues of faith, belief and the church's relationship with a changing world, he said.

In the past 14 months, there has been a dramatic shift in the United States, Germany and some other countries grappling with the issue, he said. Beyond the familiar disappointment and disgust over clerical abuse, Father Zollner said there is a growing spiritual desolation, which St. Ignatius defined as the state of the soul in which there is a decrease in faith, hope, love, trust and orientation.

It is caused by "a sense of betrayal and concern about leadership who did not abuse but were negligent or covered up more or less actively and obfuscated information," he said.

Pope Francis and others in church leadership have begun to speak about the systemic elements that must be addressed, including clericalism, abuse of power, abuse of conscience and an inability to face reality, Father Zollner said.

In his letter to bishops and leaders of religious orders before the summit on abuse, Pope Francis reminded them of their responsibility to understand and act on the issue consistently and take common responsibility together for their actions, Father Zollner said.

"2018 is a year of change. We are at another level of awareness," he said.

The actions reflect societal change, too, including the #MeToo movement. "The gods of sport and film were thrown down from their thrones, as were some cardinals. The untouchables have become touchable and are facing prison sentences," he said.

Father Zollner has traveled to 60 countries on six continents to speak with church leaders and laypeople. He said the clergy abuse issue is not in the forefront of church or public concern in 75 percent of the countries, although there are cases and some are reported. This is caused by a combination of factors including both church and society not making it a priority, and concern with other types of child abuse such as sexual violence, child labor, child soldiers, and inadequate education, health and safety for children.

While he was encouraged by the nominal increase in awareness of the issue by participants in the Vatican summit, Father Zollner said he was disappointed that "in some quarters of the church," there is still active resistance to identifying clergy abusers and little acknowledgement of the damage done to victims.

He attributed some resistance to historical experience. Father Zollner explained but did not condone the actions of leaders in former Communist countries where interactions with the police were sometimes brutal.

"Reporting a priest who has abused is like handing one's son over to execution," he said.

Father Zollner said restoration of shattered trust in church leadership must include consistent positive action, change of attitude, help and expert advice from laypeople and a willingness to embrace responsibility, accountability and transparency.

Even in places where the tightest child safeguard standards are in place and victims are heard and compensated, like the United States and Australia, people are still angry and frustrated and think "their bishops don't get it," Father Zollner said. "People suffer from safeguarding fatigue."

They need to be able to believe that their leader will mean what he says and listen, commit and follow through on an action, he said.

Father Zollner cautioned that stricter norms and laws are not an automatic solution and will not

change people's behavior. Different church laws are needed for dealing with various categories of abuse, he said. In addition, a change in the culture will require a change in attitude.

Father Zollner said the Vatican is on course and has a timetable to do specific things, including enacting a new law for reporting allegations in the Vatican City State and a guideline for jurisprudence on how bishops and religious superiors should handle and document abuse allegations.

He said task forces of three or four people will soon be deployed to each continent to help bishops' conferences and religious orders develop and implement guidelines for response and action.

"There will be follow-up and concrete measures," he said.

Researchers Smith and Terry described their two comprehensive surveys of the abuse crisis, which covered the nature and scope of the crisis beginning in 1950, and it causes and context.

They confirmed that despite an increase in reporting, the data over a period of more than 60 years shows that the bulk of abuse incidents took place from 1974 to 1982; approximately 4 percent of priests in ministry in U.S. dioceses had an allegation of abuse. And 3.5 percent of the priests with allegations were responsible for 26 percent of the total victims. Half of the accused priests had one known victim; and abuse persisted for an average of 4.9 years. Victims were male in 80.9 percent of cases and most were between 10 and 14 years old.

"This is a problem whose total extent is unknown but whose incidence is consistent," Smith said.

Statistics gathered from dioceses for the John Jay report in 2002 exactly mirror those collected by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate for a 2017 report, she said.

Smith and Terry said their findings show pedophilia is uncommon and neither homosexuality nor celibacy cause people to abuse a child. Most abusers are "generalists" who abuse without regard to gender or age. Smith said 80 percent of men who abused minors also had been involved with adult women.

She said abuse may be a response to loneliness, lack of intimacy or lack of respect for boundaries. There is no scientifically valid way to profile potential offenders and education is the best way to reduce the vulnerability of potential victims, she said.

The symposium was organized and hosted by the Fordham Center on Religion and Culture. Moderators included David Gibson and Peter Steinfels, the center's current and founding directors, respectively, and Kerry Robinson, global ambassador for the Leadership Roundtable.

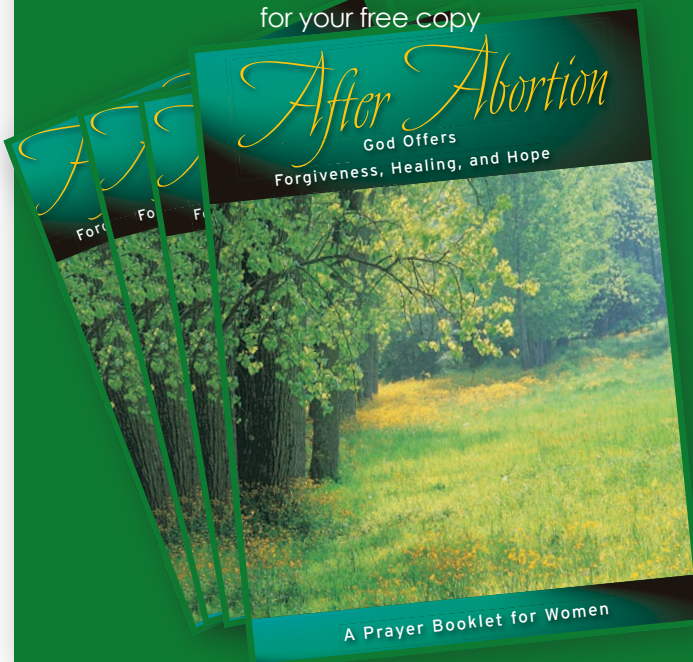
