27th PLEDGE UPDATE & REPAIRS COMPLETED

Sunday, May 12, 2019 FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Dear Parishioners, Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The remaining major projects are the new flooring design in the Church. We had hoped by Christmas 2018 to have completed the new Church flooring, but our plans and finances are scheduled for 2019. A monument on the site of the first Church building will be erected in remembrance of the first church in the parish and in honor of the generations of Catholics since 1949 in this faith community as disciples of this Body of Christ. This monument is scheduled for the spring of 2019.

As pledges are made and paid, we will continue to address the one remaining project, which can be found on our parish website. See what this good parish has accomplished already in total pledges and number of donors! At this point in the Campaign, 867 donors helped us reach \$1,389,935 in total pledges. Total pledges paid are \$1,367,557. Balance due is \$22,367. It is not the intention of the Fix-It Campaign to place the parish in debt. As a parish, we spent 9 years paying off the \$3.8 million debt. We will only address the project as we raise the funds to pay. As Thomas Jefferson advised, "Never spend your money before you have it!" My Grandmother Ryan said the same message in her own way! For details on the campaign, including the presentation that was shown at Masses as well as the information on Charitable Giving Options, visit our parish website, www.stfrancislzparish.org. Thank you to those who have already responded with a pledge toward the \$1.7 million goal. St. Francis de Sales has a long history of generous giving. I respectfully ask for the prayers, involvement, and sacrifice of many, if not all, in the parish in making a pledge towards the Fix-It Campaign in addition to the generosity you provide each Sunday offering. For example, if 1,000 parishioners pledge the suggested amount of \$850 per year for 2 years, we will reach our campaign goal immediately to conclude the project. Please, everyone, participate through a prayer and a pledge. All the funds we raise in the Fix-It Campaign stay within the parish. I want to express my gratitude to Deacon John Sfire, Jason Sfire, and Amie Paige of The Fidelity Group for doing an extensive study of our parish campus, as was presented in the Fix-It Campaign presentation. I have asked the Fidelity Group, under the leadership of Deacon John Sfire and Jason Sfire, to serve as Project Managers of the Fix-It Campaign. I also want to offer my appreciation for the guidance and involvement of Tom Purtell, Chair of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC), Marty Bush, Member of the PPC; Mike Carlino, Chair of the Parish Finance Council; Doug Samz, Member of the Parish Finance Council; Christine DePrez, Cornerstone Bank Liaison; Laura Angelini, Business Manager; and Pam Lynch, Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries.

Intentional Discipleship Workshop

Disciple: Those who accept Jesus' message to follow Him.

Intentional Disciples: Following Jesus (purposeful and deliberate)

Sherry Weddell's Forming Intentional Disciples
Statistics from the PEW Research Center (www.siena.org, pg. 4): For every 100 people who identify as Catholic:

- 51 never show up
- 45 go to Mass once a month
- 4 are the core, committed people who make church activities happen

Other Statistics:

- Only 30% of people who were raised Catholic are still practicing (p. 24).
- The fastest growing demographic is currently the unaffiliated/"NONE" (p. 19).
- Of the people who left to go to another church—the majority said their spiritual needs were not being met and they found a religion they liked more (p. 28).
- Of the people who left to become a NONE—the majority said they "just drifted away" and "stopped believing in the religion's teachings" (p. 32).

The key—and it's all about a Relationship with Jesus

The thresholds of Conversion:

- **Trust**—A person is able to trust or has a positive association with Jesus, the Church, or a Christian believer.
- **Curiosity**—A person is intrigued by or desires to know more about Jesus, His life, His teachings, or some aspect of the Christian faith.
- Openness—A person acknowledges to himself or herself

and to God that they are open to the possibility of a personal and spiritual change.

- **Seeking**—The person moves from being passive to an active seeking to know God.
- Intentional Discipleship

 (following Jesus)—This is the
 decision to "drop your nets" to commit to follow Jesus as
 an obedient disciple.

As the Catechism and Matthew 28:19-20 states: "The Church by her very nature is missionary, sent by Christ to all the nations to make disciples of them." (CCC 767, Mt 28:19-20) Our goal/the Church's goal is to follow Jesus' call and help others follow Jesus' call.

Keith also facilitated the Archdiocese Intentional Discipleship day with Sherry. He is the former Director of the Office for the New Evangelization and a deacon for the Archdiocese of Chicago.

He has identified 3 steps in this process:

- **Making**—make disciples—help people encounter Jesus and say yes.
- **Maturing**—grow and deepen their relationship—once you get it, you long to know Jesus more.
- Sacraments are seen in a new way.
- Living a moral life is not imposed, is a choice, a response.
- Missioning—go out and share with others.

When you are a disciple, when you choose to follow Jesus—You long to know Jesus more...

Notes on Intentional Discipleship/Parish Mission from the Parish Pastoral Council Meeting Minutes (October 28, 2019)

Judy Reilly gave the group an update on Intentional Discipleship and the Parish Mission. She distributed a handout so everyone could follow along. The topics she discussed included the following:

Why make disciples?

How do we make Jesus Christ relevant in people's lives, and how do we offer others this gift of friendship with Jesus?

The timeline of the Parish's mission of Intentional Discipleship from 2007, when there were Bible study classes, through August 2017, when Deacon Keith Strohm was brought on board, to today's date when there are now the Build and Equip groups.

Formation Fruit: Judy discussed what groups have

developed as "fruit" of this mission which include the Called and Gifted workshop, the Growing Disciples corner in the church bulletin and newsletter, a mom's group, continued monthly meetings of first generation of Equip, Judy speaking at the school to staff regarding discipleship, the ABLAZE parish mission, and now the second generation groups of BUILD (building a friendship with Jesus) and EQUIP (equipping with tools needed to share Jesus with others). There are currently 32 facilitators with 135 new participants comprised of 31 in EQUIP and 102 in BUILD.

What's next?

- A 3rd generation of Build/Equip
- Alpha A formation process exploring the big issues and the basics of the Christian faith, including the Gospel message. This would take place over 11 weeks.
- 2019 Mission
- The continuation of Bible study

uring the 1863 Chattanooga campaign, nuns from the Sisters of Charity tended to wounded soldiers in a Nashville, Tenn., field hospital. As they prepared to move on to another site, the men cried out in protest. Nuns on the battlefield had become a great comforts to the dying, and the soldiers passed around a petition urging them to stay.

As it circulated, one sick soldier delivered a speech praising the nuns, according to Pvt. William H. Nelson of the 19th Illinois Infantry. "I want to sign that paper. I would sign it 50 times, if asked," the wounded soldier said. "For the sisters have been to me as my mother since I have been here and, I believe, had I been here before, I would have been well long ago. But if the sisters leave, I know I shall die." More than 230 men signed the petition, and the nuns stayed.

battlefields, offering respite from the horrors of combat. Mother Elizabeth Ann Seton's Sisters of Charity were the largest group, with more than 300

alongside Catholic priests and Protestant ministers.

Shortly after the war, Catholic historian David Power Conyngham compiled testimonies, letters and newspaper clippings about the veteran Catholic chaplains and religious sisters. After his death, Conyngham's manuscript was forgotten in the University of Notre Dame's archives. Now it is being published as "Soldiers of the Cross."

It's telling that the sisters left little in testimony about themselves. What we know comes almost exclusively from the men they helped, and the book's collection of primary documents shows soldiers offering high praise to the sisters. It's unusual, considering the prevalent anti-Catholicism of antebellum America. But their service to American men of all faiths was living proof that these Catholics did not only take orders from the pope in Rome.

"I am not of your Church, and have always been Some 700 religious sisters ministered Civil War taught to believe it to be nothing but evil," an imprisoned Union soldier wrote to the Sisters of Mercy's mother superior in an 1864 letter. "However, actions speak louder than words, and I am free to sisters ministering to Union and Confederate troops admit, that if Christianity does exist on the earth, it

Ambrose Burnside offered the highest praise, saying that his words could never describe the gratitude his men felt for the sisters' deeds. "Of the Sisters of Mercy there is little need for me to speak," he wrote. "Their good deeds are the rosary on her hip.

Confederates shared similar sentiments. Gen. P.G.T. Officers wrote personal commendations of the Beauregard commended the "indefatigable" and sisters. John E. Michener, a Union soldier captured "unremitting" service of the religious sisters who in the summer of 1864, in a letter thanked the Sisters administered to his troops throughout the war, of Mercy at the Confederate hospital in Charleston, "Even Protestant commanding officers were always S.C., for bravely administering to men dying of yellow fever—even when Confederate officers were "too much alarmed to even furnish water for the sick and dying." He added, "I know full well, that but for your untiring devotion to our helpless and under their care, that these heroes of many hard unfortunate officers and soldiers, thousands to-day fought battles, looked upon them as their own would have been sleeping the sleep that knows no waking."

The response was similar among the North's In one typical episode at a Kentucky hospital served by the Sisters of the Holy Cross, a Protestant chaplain witnessed a nun serve the sick without rest from daybreak until well past sunset. "It is as mystery to me, how those sisters can stand at their post without ever giving up," he told a friend. Then, turning to the sister, he asked, "How do you account for it?" The nun only smiled at him and gestured to

Statement of Cardinal Cupich on the Appearance of Minister Louis Farrakhan at St. Sabina Church

Friday, May 10, 2019

Without consulting me, Fr. Michael Pfleger invited Minister Louis Farrakhan to speak at St. Sabina Church in response to Facebook's decision to ban him from its platforms. Minister Farrakhan could have taken the opportunity to deliver a unifying message of God's love for all his children. Instead, he repeatedly smeared the Jewish people, using a combination of thinly veiled discriminatory rhetoric and outright slander. He suggested that "Talmudic thought" sanctioned pedophilia and misogyny. He referred to Jewish people as "satanic," asserting that he was sent by God to separate the "good Jews" from the "satanic Jews."

Such statements shock the conscience. People of faith are called to live as signs of God's love for the whole human family, not to demonize any of its members. This is all the more true of religious leaders, who have a sacred duty never to leverage the legitimacy of their ministry to heap blame upon a group of persons, and never to deploy inflammatory rhetoric, long proven to incite violence. Antisemitic rhetoric - discriminatory invective of any kind - has no place in American public life, let alone in a Catholic church. I apologize to my Jewish brothers and sisters, whose friendship I treasure, from whom I learn so much, and whose covenant with God remains eternal.

I encourage Fr. Pfleger to accept the invitation of the Illinois Holocaust Museum and Education Center to meet with their leadership and dialogue with survivors. And I pledge to continue our work with our city's religious leaders and all people of good will to promote tolerance, respect, and nonviolence. As the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr, said, "Hate is too great a burden to bear."



- Parents are ultimately responsible for the well-being of their children, so they should be the ones to grant permission, for any surgeries... especially dangerous abortion procedures.


