29th PLEDGE UPDATE & REPAIRS COMPLETED

Dear Parishioners, Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The remaining major projects are the new flooring design in the Church. We had hoped by Christmas 2018 to have completed the new Church flooring, but our plans and finances are scheduled for 2019. A monument on the site of the first Church building will be erected in remembrance of the first church in the parish and in honor of the generations of Catholics since 1949 in this faith community as disciples of this Body of Christ. This monument is scheduled for the summer of 2019.

As pledges are made and paid, we will continue to address the one remaining project, which can be found on our parish website. See what this good parish has accomplished already in total pledges and number of donors! At this point in the Campaign, **878** donors helped us reach **\$1,414,959** in total pledges. Total pledges paid are **\$1,397,137**. Balance due is **\$17,822**. It is not the intention of the Fix-It Campaign to place the parish in debt. As a parish, we spent 9 years paying off the \$3.8 million debt. We will only address the project as we raise the funds to pay. As Thomas Jefferson advised, "Never spend your money before you have it!" My Grandmother Ryan said the same message in her own way! For details on the campaign, including the presentation that was shown at Masses as well as the information on Charitable Giving Options, visit our parish website, **www.stfrancislzparish.org**. **Thank you to those who have already responded with a pledge toward the \$1.7 million goal.** St. Francis de Sales has a long history of generous giving. I respectfully ask for the prayers, involvement, and sacrifice of many, if not all, in the parish in making a pledge towards the Fix-It Campaign in addition to the generosity you provide each Sunday offering. For example, **if 1,000 parishioners pledge the suggested amount of \$850 per year for 2 years, we will reach our campaign goal immediately to conclude the project.** Please, everyone, participate through a prayer and a pledge. All the funds we raise in the Fix-It Campaign stay within the parish. I want to express my gratitude to Deacon John Sfire, Jason Sfire, and Amie Paige of The Fidelity Group for doing an extensive study of our parish campus, as was presented in the Fix-It Campaign presentation. I have asked the Fidelity Group, under the leadership of Deacon John Sfire and Jason Sfire, to serve as Project Managers of the Fix-It Campaign. I also want to offer my appreciation for the guidance and involvement of Tom Purtell, Chair of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC), Marty Bush, Member of the PPC; Mike Carlino, Chair of the Parish Finance Council; Doug Samz, Member of the Parish Finance Council; Christine DePrez, Cornerstone Bank Liaison; Laura Angelini, Business Manager; and Pam Lynch, Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries.

USCCB MEETING ADDRESSES IMPORTANT CHURCH ISSUES

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

During the week of June 10-14, I was in Baltimore attending the meetings of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), during which we made substantial progress in addressing the recent issues that have confronted us in the church. In addition to the general sessions with the full body of bishops, I also had a four-and-a-half hour meeting of the Committee on Canonical Affairs and Church Governance, of which I am a member, on Monday afternoon, June 10, as well as another three-and-a-half hour meeting of that same committee on Wednesday evening, June 12.

The outcome of these meetings was that we voted to approve directives designed to implement the document *Vos Estis Lux Mundi* (You are the light of the world), issued by Pope Francis in May to help the Catholic Church safeguard its members from abuse and hold its leaders accountable. We also approved the document, *Acknowledging Our Episcopal Commitments and the Protocol regarding Available Nonpenal Restrictions on Bishops who have resigned or have been removed due to misconduct or negligence in office*. In addition, we voted to authorize the implementation of a third-party reporting system that would allow people to make confidential reports of abuse complaints against bishops through a toll-free telephone number and online.

The full text of these documents and news releases summarizing them is available online at the USCCB website. Since most of the media attention was on these agenda items, you might have missed some other significant actions that our bishops' conference took. Among these, we approved four strategic priorities for the USCCB 2021-2024 Strategic Plan:

- Evangelization: Form a joyful band of missionary disciples
- Life and Dignity of the Human Person: Serve the common good as a leaven in a free society
- Protect and Heal God's Children: Restore integrity and foster virtue
- Vocations: Equip all Christ's disciples for mission

These strategic priorities are then broken down further into greater detail through "emphasis areas," such as:

- Foster an evangelizing focus in catechesis and Catholic schools
- Work to heal the scourge of hatred based on race and/or religion
- Protect and defend the dignity of migrants and refugees, of the poor and those on the peripheries
- Defend the right to life for all people, especially the unborn, elderly, sick, dying and persons with disabilities; and fight the advance of abortion, infanticide, assisted suicide, euthanasia and the death penalty

- Defend and secure religious liberty and freedom of association
- Foster reverence for God's creation, our common home
- Create and maintain safe environments through sound policies and procedures
- Extend and ensure effective collaboration with the laity
- Cultivate an ever-deepening spirituality of chastity and virtue
- Foster lifelong discernment and formation to fulfill one's God-given vocation
- Prepare for and sustain the living out of marriage and family life
- Create a culture that nurtures consecrated life and Holy Orders
- Encourage the laity in their mission to evangelize society

We also approved a revised National Directory for the Formation, Ministry, and Life of Permanent Deacons in the United States and a revised passage on the death penalty for the U.S. Catholic Catechism for Adults to bring it into conformity with the recent revision to the universal Catechism of the Catholic Church (no. 2267). The revision to the passage on the death penalty for the U.S. Catholic Catechism for Adults must also receive the recognition from the Holy See.

In addition, the bishops expressed their support for the Bishop of Marquette (Michigan) to continue to advance on the local level the cause for canonization of the Servant of God, Irving Francis Houle. I expressed my support for this cause for canonization, noting that as a married man with five children, his cause for sainthood would provide an inspirational example of faithful marriage and family life.

I also took the occasion to say a public word of thanks to Pope Francis for the wonderful news that on June 12 he proclaimed Father Augustine Tolton of Quincy as "Venerable," making Father Tolton one step closer to being declared a saint by the Catholic Church. The term "Venerable" means he is officially recognized by the Catholic Church as having lived a life of heroic virtue. Now that Father Tolton has been declared Venerable, I have asked our staff of the diocesan Curia to begin exploring the establishment of a shrine to honor Venerable Father Tolton. One possible location could be the now-closed St. Boniface Church in Quincy. I hope to make an announcement about this later this year.

In the meantime, please pray for the intercession of Venerable Augustine Tolton, especially for those suffering from seemingly incurable medical conditions, and be sure to let me know if any such prayers result in a miraculous healing.

May God give us this grace. Amen.

SEEING ABORTION

We stand at a pivotal point in the great moral debate over abortion in our country—not because new arguments have emerged, but rather because laws so breathtaking in their barbarism have been passed, and a film so visceral in its presentation of the reality of abortion has found a wide audience.

As John Henry Newman reminded us, assent to a proposition is rarely a matter of acquiescing to rational demonstration alone; instead, it often has to do with the accumulation of argument, image, impression, experience, and witness.

The legal protocols now in effect in New York, Delaware, and a number of other states allowing for the butchering of a child in the womb at any point in his or her nine-month gestation—and indeed, on the clinic or hospital table, should the child by some miracle survive the abortion—have sickened much of the country. And they have allowed people to see, in unmistakably clear terms, the full implications of the twisted “pro-choice” ideology. If a mother chooses to bring her baby to term and to be born, that child is, somehow by that choice, the subject of dignity and worthy of the full protection of the law; and if a mother chooses otherwise, even a newborn baby struggling to breathe on an operating table can be murdered and discarded like so much garbage. Biology and metaphysics be damned: our subjective decisions determine reality—and the result is state-sanctioned infanticide. So obviously insane, so clearly dangerous, so unmistakably wicked are these laws that they are causing many people to reconsider their position on abortion.

Unplanned, the story of Abby Johnson's wrenching transition from director of a Planned Parenthood clinic to vocal opponent of abortion, has proven to be a surprisingly popular film, despite its rather grim theme and despite considerable institutional opposition. As many have pointed out, Mrs. Johnson is playing a role analogous to that played by Harriet Beecher Stowe in the nineteenth century. While there were plenty of arguments on both sides of the slavery debate at the time, many advocates of slavery underwent a conversion to abolitionism, not because of rational demonstrations but precisely through the influence of Stowe's vivid presentation of the concrete reality of slavery in *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. So today, arguments and slogans on both sides of the abortion controversy are well known, and most people seem more or less locked in their respective camps. But *Unplanned* doesn't so much argue as show. “Abortion” becomes, accordingly, not an abstract issue, but an in-your-face, real, and bloody fact.

The film opens with the event that proved decisive for Abby Johnson herself. As director and administrator of a Planned Parenthood clinic, she was certainly aware of what was happening on the premises, but she had rarely been involved in an actual abortion. One afternoon, she was summoned to the operating room and asked to hold the device that allowed the doctor to see the ultrasound image of the child in the womb. As the physician went about his work, Abby could clearly see the child resting comfortably and then reacting violently as a suctioning device was inserted into the womb. To her horror, she then saw a tiny arm sucked off, only to reappear, moments later, as a bloody soup in a catheter next to her. As she watched, unable to take her eyes off of the horrific display, she saw the severely wounded baby continuing to evade the device, until a leg disappeared, then another arm, and finally the baby's head. And again, the remains of the living child surged like slush into the catheter. With that, she ran from the room, vomited in the bathroom, and resolved to dissociate herself forever from Planned Parenthood. The film makes clear that she had heard arguments against abortion all of her life, for her parents and husband were ardently and vocally pro-life, but she made the decision after she saw what it meant to end the life of an unborn child. Her hope, obviously, is that her film will have a similar effect on many others.

One of the most memorable scenes in *Unplanned* deals with an odd little party that took place at the clinic after hours. Abby, it turns out, was pregnant, and her colleagues, all female, gathered to give her a baby shower. Out came the balloons, the thoughtful presents, the encouraging hugs—all meant to show their joy at the birth of a new baby. But then we realize that these medical professionals, these good friends of Abby, have spent their entire day killing the babies of other women. Indeed, the blood of those procedures is on their shoes and scrubs. How is this scene possible? The condition for its possibility is the lunatic ideology of “choice” referenced above: if the baby is desired, let's have a party; if the baby is unwanted, kill him and cast his remains in a dumpster. Pro-choice advocates must know that this is the implication of their philosophy, but *Unplanned* makes them see it.

In 1850, lots of good and thoughtful people defended the institution of slavery. Now, only insane people would. In 2019, lots of decent and thoughtful people defend the pro-choice position. One can only hope that these recent laws, and this viscerally disturbing film, will hasten the day when only insane people would.

WHY DO WE HAVE TO GO TO MASS ON SUNDAY?

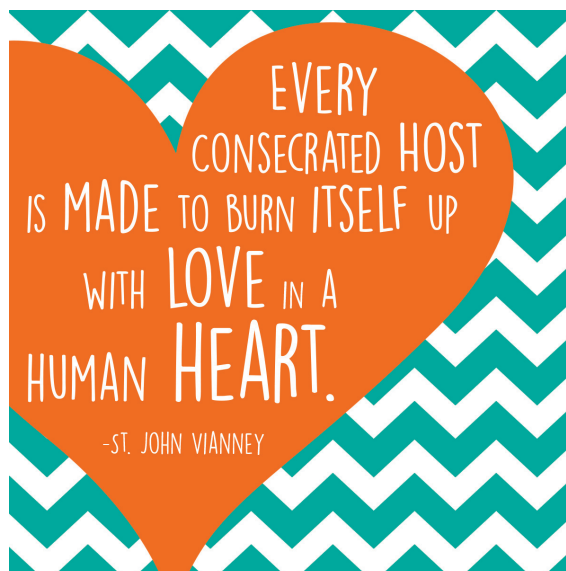
"Why do we have to go to Mass?" is one of the most frequently asked questions that students address to the religion teachers, and recently I received an email from a former student asking for an article but she could share with his friends that answers that very question.

There's obviously a scriptural basis for going to Mass, but there is also a basis in human reason. The human person is the subject of a host of duties. It is the virtue of justice that dictates how he ought to respond to those duties. Firstly, he has a duty towards his equals: a duty to pay back what he borrowed, to tell the truth, a duty not to kill, etc. But he also has debts that he cannot fully repay, but which he is required to try to repay to the fullest extent possible. For example, we have a debt to the social whole, for we have benefited from the generosity of countless others in ways that we cannot fully appreciate. It is the virtue of natural piety that inclines a person, in gratitude, to render due honor and service to the country as a whole. We have a debt to our parents that cannot be fully remitted, and it is again the virtue of filial piety that inclines us to render due honor and worship to them. But above all, we have a debt to God that cannot be fully repaid.

Everything we have been given, every blessing and every human good that we enjoy comes ultimately from God, the First Cause of all that is. It is the virtue of religion, the most perfect part of the virtue of justice, that seeks to render due honor and worship to God within the same spirit of gratitude. And so it is reasonable, a requirement of justice in fact, to be religious. One is not entirely just if one is not religious.

For a Catholic, though, that's half the story. There are more weighty reasons that are offered by divine revelation. Christ came to save us. He came to save us from sin and the prospect of eternal death. He came ultimately to die

for us: "There is a baptism with which I must be baptized, and how great is my anguish until it is accomplished!" (Lk 12,50). It is his death and resurrection that saves us. He alone could buy us back from unending death by offering his life as a ransom because he alone is divine, that is, fully God and fully man. His sacrifice on the cross is the perfect act of religion offered on our behalf, and it is this act that justifies us, redeems us, and saves us: "Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person,

so perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us. How much more then, since we are not justified by his blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath. Indeed, if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, how much more, once reconciled, will we be saved by his life" (Rm 5,7-10).

But this perfect acts of religion, offered once two thousand years ago, is perpetuated until the end of time. It is represented (made present) every Mass. The Mass is a sacrifice, the same sacrifice offered on Calvary. This sacrificial act is opened up for us in order that we might enter into it, if we so choose. Christ, the eternal Son, has made his perfect offering to God the Father into real food and drink: "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him" (Jh=n 6, 54-56). The Eucharist is literally Christ's body and blood. A priest is one who's been given the power to change ordinary bread and wine into Christ's body and blood. He alone can say Mass, thus making it possible for us to enter into the mystery of Good Friday. And it was Christ who said: "Do this in remembrance of me" (Lk 22,19).

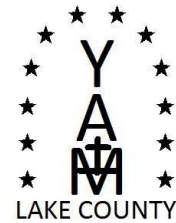
To sum this up, we have a natural duty to worship God in some visible way that expresses a real internal act of devotion. And this natural application of justice is further confirmed in the first three commandments of the Decalogue: "You shall have no other gods besides me".

This is an extension of the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament which occurs in every Mass: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament flows from the sacrifice of the Mass and serves to deepen our hunger for Communion with Christ and the rest of the Church.
