In Saint Luke's Gospel, Jesus not only gives us words to use in our conversations with God (the Our Father), but also promises that God always listens to our prayers.



after preaching at five Masses yesterday. The gospel yesterday was the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Lk 10: 25-37). Because I found it so informative in doing my research on this gospel, I decided to write this week's DC about it.

The Parable of the Good Samaritan is one that we all know, or at least remember, going way back in our memory. As we know, a parable is a story in the gospels that requires (as most parables do) our own interpretation of the message. The one is no different. So let's look at what was taking place 2,000 years ago in the Parable of the Good Samaritan.

Jesus was with a group of Jewish lawmakers. One of the lawyers asked Jesus; "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus asked him; "what is written in the law? how do you read it?" The lawyer answered Jesus saying (paraphrased) "love the Lord your God with all of your being, and love your neighbor as yourself". Jesus said to him; "you have answered right, do this, and you will live". Then Jesus told him the story of the Good Samaritan and how two Jewish leaders came upon the man beaten half to death and did not tend to his wounds, but when the Samaritan came upon him, he stopped and tended to the man's wounds. Jesus then asked the lawmaker; "which of these three do you think proved neighbor to the man who fell among the robbers?" The answer was; "the one who showed mercy on him." And Jesus said to him; "go and do likewise."

It is important to note that the Samaritans and the Jews were enemies of each other. That is why it is important to understand that is was unusual for the Samaritan to help a Jew. Also we should note that part of the Jewish law, which was very strict at the time, forbade Jews from assisting those who are near death. But, nonetheless, Jesus' story was told, I believe, for a very specific purpose. That we must "love our neighbor" no matter what ethnic group, what nationality, what background in life, they come from.

ood morning. I am writing this on Monday morning In my homily, I presented the idea of Jesus presenting this Parable in modern day times. Perhaps Jesus would say instead of the Good Samaritan, he would say a Good Muslim or a Good Atheist, using modern day contrarians in His depiction.

> You see, I believe that it is important for us to look at the Gospels and utilize their teachings as they relate to our everyday experiences, not by trying to apply them to the times during which they were written. For instance, we should be asking the same question that was asked of Jesus; "Teacher, what do I do to inherit eternal life?" THIS IS THE QUESTION WE SHOULD ALL BE ASKING EVERY DAY. And while the rules of the Church continue to change over time, they seem to adapt to the "times we live in". What I mean by that is the basic premise which guides us through our Christian beliefs doesn't change, some of our means of accomplishing them does change based on societal circumstances.

> I feel that this particular Gospel, Luke 10: 25-37, sums up that which we should live by to obtain eternal life with Jesus. I have been preaching and writing this same thing for years and will continue to do so as my life goes on. Sometimes I mention that it seems like I am continually repeating myself regarding the issue of "the two most important teachings of Jesus Christ", LOVE THE LORD, THY GOD, AND LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOR. No matter where he or she is from, no matter what ethnic group they represent, no matter what the color of their skin, etc., we must "love our neighbor" to obtain eternal life.

> Following this, we may have to make a change in our lives, but so be it. There is nothing more important to us than "obtaining eternal life" when our journey on earth is complete.


RING THOSE BELLS

JUBILEE GARDEN

Here is a summary of what we did at Saint Francis de Sales Jubilee Garden 2018 Season from Sharon Fredrickson, the coordinator for Jubilee Garden.

Despite uncooperative weather, we finished the season out with 593 pounds of organically grown produce! This could not be possible without the St. Francis de Sales community. The people are wonderful to work with! The land that Bill Haberstroh and his family graciously donated, as the place for Jubilee Garden, is beautiful but you can imagine the amount of plants and work to fill a 50 x 60 foot garden bed. Not to mention plowing prior to planting (thanks Jim Haberstroh!), rototilling, watering, fertilizing, weeding, building fences, harvesting, as well as mowing the grass and maintaining the lawn and garden equipment. However, every Saturday, despite how daunting, it all gets done and it no time at all.

With the seeds that St. Francis de Sales purchased in late spring, parishioners planted them indoors and cared for them until late May, when we transplanted them into Jubilee Garden. Once all seeds were sown and the transplants, onions, and spring garlic planted, we realized we needed more plants. All additional plants have been graciously donated by parishioners and Hawthorne Gardens in Hawthorn Woods. In addition, garden centers like Hoffman's in Volo and Hawthorn Gardens in Hawthorn Woods provided gracious discounts for additional plant material.

Our crop has been tomatoes, peppers, carrots, beets, green onions, onions, eggplant, radishes and green beans. Parishioners donated landscape fabric to line the aisles to keep the weeds down. After the first killing frost, we planted German Red Garlic that we plan to harvest in July 2019.

For 2019, we are ready. The folks from Emmaus House and the food pantry like onions, peppers (the hotter the better), beets, green onions and beans. We are ready for them!

- We planted fall garlic when we closed up the garden in 2018. The plan is to harvest in July 2019.
- We will plant a spring garlic that will harvest a couple of months later.
- We have our bean fencing ready to protect our beans.
- With the help of Bob McHenry in 2018, we built a wall around the green beans (what I refer to as rabbit candy - they love the beans, the plant, everything) to keep the rabbits out. It was a great success and will be one used again.
- Volunteers are helping to make seed tape (via toilet paper of all things) to make planting easier and ensure proper spacing to avoid crowding.

As always, please join us for the 2019 Jubilee Garden Season! NO GARDENING EXPERIENCE NECESSARY! Farming season has begun and will continue on Saturdays through October, with the exception of Memorial Day weekend. We meet from 8 to 11am on Saturday mornings. Your help is needed, even if only for an hour! For more details, please call Sharon Fredrickson at 847-643-6633. The Jubilee Garden is located on the north side of Route 22, just east of Quentin.



Thank you Hoffman's Garden Center in Volo and Hawthorn Gardens in Hawthorn Woods for their donating plant material to fill up the Jubilee Garden. Your support is what helps make the Jubilee Garden a success! We are behind in our harvest due to the spring rains but it won't be long! Fellow parishioners, late summer and fall here and the next best time to plant! 


